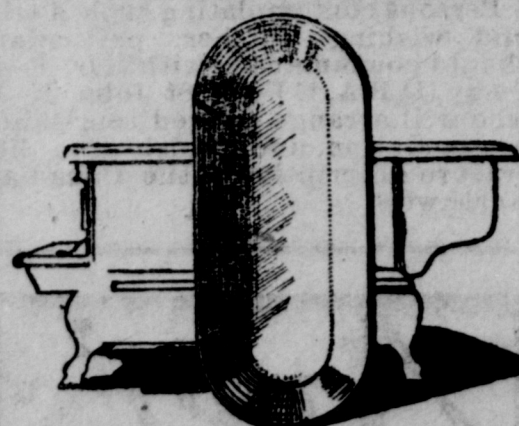

### An Interesting Family.

Six years ago Jessie was a little spotted baby deer, whose mother had been either frightened away or killed. She was picked up near the railroad bridge over Millinocket stream by men working on the section and given to Mrs. Edwin Adams, who then lived in the section house near the bridge. Mrs. Adams put the fawn out in the woods for several nights hoping that the mother would return and get it, but this did not happen, so Mrs. Adams fed it from a bottle until it was able to take solid food, and in due time it developed into a fine doe.

Last winter some dogs were chasing a buck and drove it in an exhausted condition upon the track ahead of the hand car. The men on the car overtook and captured him, and presented him to the owner of Jessie, who now lives near the round house. Later he was liberated.

Now Jessie walks about the enclosure at the rear of Mr. Adams' house accompanied by three little spotted fellows, who look at the visitor with a shy curiosity that is amusing. Jessie herself is perfectly tame. The writer observed this family for some moments when Jessie walked up and licked his hand with as much unconcern as would any domestic animal. She probably could not be driven away, but she is kept in an enclosure that she might not be chased by dogs or killed by hunters. The little fellows get through the wire fence of the enclosure and go away for a half day at a time, but always return by nightfall. —Millinocket Journal.

### SQUIRRELS ARE "HANDY."

The "handiness" of the squirrel is something extraordinary in the animal world. He sits on his hind paws and uses the fore paws in many ways just as a man does. He strikes with them and wards off a blow from another, and their little quarrels rarely go further than attempts to cuff each other like children.
