### MORE LAW.

H. A. Connell and the C. P. R. had another round in their finish fight at St. John before the Chief Justice on Saturday last. Honors were about even. On behalf of the C. P. R., Weldon & McLean made application for an injunction to prevent Mr. Connell from interfering with the Company's operations in connection with the pier in the mill pond. Mr. J. C. Hartley for Mr. Connell resisted the application. The Judge took time to consider, promising a decision at an early date. The merry warfare thus continues, and promises to be of a lengthy duration, as neither combatant has so far evinced much of an intention to let up.

### Dr. McLeod Acquitted.

Dr. Percy D. McLeod of Boston, a native of Kings County and having several relatives in this town, was acquitted on Saturday last of being an accessory after the fact of the death of Miss Susan Agnes Geary the suit case victim. Hunt and Crawford the wretches who pleaded guilty themselves and strove to fasten crime upon Dr. McLeod, were sentenced to six years in the penitentiary. Dr. McLeod went on the stand in his own defence and made a distinct impression on the jury. Readers will remember that Miss Geary was a member of a show company. She got into trouble and had an abortion performed by a vile gang in Boston. Dr. McLeod was called in later when it was seen that she was suffering from blood poison. He operated for that complaint, but the case was already hopeless. The girl died and the wretches in whose hands she had fallen cut her body up, packed it in suit cases and threw them into the sea, hoping to avoid detection and punishment. When the remains were discovered and identified the real criminals tried to mitigate their own punishment by blaming Dr. McLeod. The doctor was ably defended, and completely vindicated himself. His friends in this town are greatly pleased to know that he has come through the trying ordeal with flying colors.

### TOWN POLITICS.

Apathy of the deepest variety seems to be the rule in so far as the best citizens are concerned with reference to the composition of the town council for 1906. No person seems to take the slightest interest in the election which is now not much more than a month distant. It is true that Coun. Stevens is in the field for the chair, but he seems to have the stage all to himself, with little likelihood of opposition if we are to judge by present appearances. To run for mayor is not an idle pastime. Each candidate who seriously expects to win must put up considerable money to meet the hundred and one legitimate expenses, if you please, and when it is the rule to purchase the "floating element," not by any means a small one, the appropriation cannot be niggardly.

When a man is once safely in the chair his troubles have only begun. He must assume considerable responsibility, with little real power, in fact become a figurehead, and get little thanks for his efforts to serve the town. Conditions are not quite so bad with the councillors. No wonder everyone is sick of the whole thing. But what are we to do? The town business must be transacted. Somebody must shoulder the responsibility. Under the circumstances we believe the ratepayers are greatly to blame if things are not just as they should be. There has been too much indifference. We believe an assessment of \$30,000 is too high for a town of this size. We think that 24 to 25 thousand should be the maximum. If the citizens want better government they may have it by giving a closer watch to town affairs. The way to reduce taxation is to watch the spending departments. The present lack of interest is regrettable. The future apparently affords little cause for comfort.
