## Cheats the Gallows.

Sau Francisco, Nov. 12.—Milton F. Andrews, wanted for the murder of Bessie Bouton at Colorado Springs, last night shot and killed his female companion, Nulda Olivis, and then killed himself. Andrews was wanted for a murderous assault on William Ellis at Berkeley, Cal. The police found Andrews and Miss Olivis last night, and when they were about to enter a house Andrews killed the woman and ended his own life.

A little over a month ago Andrews and the woman arrived on a steamer from Australia. On the voyage they formed the acquaintance of William Ellis, a horseman, who was known to have considerable money in his possession. Friendly relations were established and when Andrews and the woman engaged a cottage at Berkeley they invited Ellis to luncheon.

During the meal Ellis was struck on the head with a hammer and the woman fired a couple of shots but they missed Ellis, who escaped and informed the police. A search of the cottage showed that the pair had made complete preparations for disposing of Ellis' body. Implements for dismembering the corpse, acid for mutilating and large pieces of oilcloth for preventing blood stains were discovered. The pair fled after Ellis' escape and were not found until last night.

By photographs Andrews was identified as the friend and slayer of Bessie Bouton of Syracuse, N. Y., who was murdered near Colorado Springs about 10 months ago. After Miss Bouton was murdered on the mountain side the slayer saturated her clothing with benzine and set it on fire. The body was so badly mutilated that only the gold-filled teeth served to identify it. A reward of \$5200 had been offered for the arrest of Andrews.

We also believe Mr Smith was more solicitous in begging votes for himself than for anyone else, and would not be much surprised to find him among the "also rans" when he again goes to the polls.

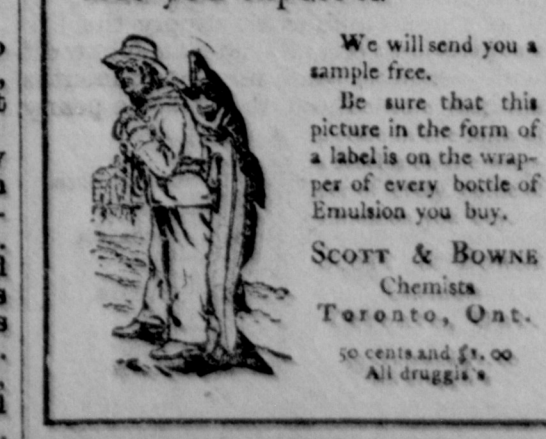

## Classes and Grades of Swine.

Because hog raisers, it is stated, do not always interpret market reports to their full meaning loss and disappointment frequently ensue, and the department of agriculture prints the following classifications: Prime heavy hogs, 350 to 500 pounds; butcher hogs, 180 to 320 pounds; packing hogs, 200 to 500 pounds; light hogs, 125 to 220 pounds; pigs, 65 to 125 pounds; roasting pigs, 15 to 20 pounds. These general classes are further subclassified and also different types of butcher and bacon hogs described on the basis adopted by the markets. The object of the above is to induce farmers to ship to the large markets uniform lots of hogs, which conform to recognized classes. Mixed lots always sell at a disadvantage. Speculators take advantage, buying several carloads lots which they sort into various classes and resell at a profit simply because they are properly graded.

To make boiled starch so that the clothes that have been starched with it will not stick to the iron add to it a small quantity of gum arabic, which has been previously dissolved, and salt.
