

**HOSPITALS CROWDED****MAJORITY OF PATIENTS WOMEN**

**Liberals Make Sweep in Alberta Elections.**

The election on the first legislature of the province of Alberta took place on Thursday last and resulted in the administration of Mr. Rutherford being sustained by a large majority. There are altogether 25 constituencies, in two of which, St. Albert and Athabasca, government supporters were returned by acclamation.

The returns so far indicate the return of twenty government supporters and five oppositionists. Reports from Innisfail, Lacombe, Pincher Creek and Ponoka are incomplete. The members, stated to be elected, include all the ministers.

The following are the results of government candidates elected: Athabasca—Bredin, by acclamation, government.

Bank—Fisher, conceded. Calgary—Cushing, minister of public works, by 31 majority.

Cardston—Wolf, 150 majority, with some places to hear from.

Edmonton—Cross, attorney-general.

Gleichen—Stewart leads by 50; election conceded.

Innisfail—Simpson leads by small majority.

Lacombe—Puffer leads by small majority.

Leduc—Telford leads by 120; election conceded.

Lethbridge—DeVeber, 175 majority with several places to hear from.

Medicine Hat—Finlay government.

McLeod—McKenzie leads by fifty majority.

Peace River—Cornwall probably elected.

Pincher Creek—Sherman, labor, leads by small majority.

St. Albert—McKinney, by acclamation.

Stony Plain—MacPherson 200 majority, election conceded.

Sturgeon—Boyle, 17 majority, with several places to hear from.

Strathcona—Rutherford, premier, by 225.

Vermillion—MacAuley.

Victoria—Walker by 160, with several places missing.

Wetaskiwin—Rosenroll by 100, with several places to hear from.

Opposition Candidates Elected. High River—Robinson leads by 40.

Ponoka—Jackson by 67, with several polls missing.

Red Deer—Gaetz leads by 100.

Rosebud—Hubert leads by 60.

**Great Liberal Victory.**

In the new province of Alberta the first provincial election were held on the King's Birthday, last Thursday. As predicted by us, the Rutherford government was handsomely sustained, out of twenty five seats there being but five unfriendly to the government. This is the kind of a wipe out our tory friends are used to getting down East in local contests, so that Mr. Bennett and his friends need not feel lonesome. The opposition leader himself went down to defeat in Calgary before Hon. W. H. Cushing, the Minister of Public Works. The effect of this great triumph will be marked in the adjoining province of Saskatchewan where premier Walter Scott and Hon. F. W. G. Haultain are soon to lock horns in a political death struggle.

**THE PEACE CONFERENCE.**

St Petersburg, Nov 15—Practically all the powers have now accepted the invitation of Emperor Nicholas to be represented at the second peace conference and the program which is usual with the conference is being elaborately prepared. The date of the convention has been tentatively fixed for May next.

M Pokotiloff, the Russian minister at Pekin has been charged by his government to conduct the negotiations with China arising from the peace treaty signed at Portsmouth.

The question covers the future of Manchuria, Russian leases of the railroad and all matters to which the assent of China is required by the treaty. The impression here is that Baron Komura, who is now at Pekin in charge of the Japanese negotiations, will seek to sell the railways, except the Liao Tung branch, to China. Russia has not yet agreed to Japan's proposition to raise the consul to the rank of Ambassador.

The delightful story of Sir Carne Rache, M. P., having been treated with profound deference and attention in a Paris hotel when there was exceptional pleasure on the management by a great influx of guests by having described himself in the visitors' book as 'Elector of Essex' has its parallel. The Hon. J. P. Vereker, a brother of the Lord Gort of the day, was Lord Mayor of Dublin in 1863, and visited Paris. He described himself as Prefect of the Liffey in the visitors' book at the hotel, and was immediately regarded as the holder of an office as important in Ireland as the office of Prefect of the Seine in France.—Westminster Gazette.

**Suicide in Carleton County.**

The body of Henry Allen Teed was discovered Thursday morning lying on the upstairs floor of an unoccupied log house on the Teed farm, situated about three miles from Benton, Carleton county, with a revolver clamped in his hand. The bullet had entered his left eye and passed through his head. He had acted strangely of late and threatened shooting himself as well as some members of the family. He was a son of the late Amos Teed and leaves a mother, brothers and sisters. He was thirty-three years old. He was found by Alexander Rogers. He had probably killed himself because of his infatuation over the wife of his brother. A jury was empanelled and brought in a verdict of suicide while temporarily insane.

**YOUNG CORBETT ALL IN.**

Says a Boston paper:—Young Corbett is all in. He got another drubbing Saturday night from Unk Russell, and now he is on the injured list, and has been obliged to cancel his matches scheduled for the next six weeks. Hog fat and short of breath he deliberately went against tough propositions thinking that he could easily dispose of them. Corbett has a lot of conceit in his dumpy make-up and is now paying the fiddler for his dancing.

Recently, Harry Tutthill, Corbett's trainer, sent word from Philadelphia to the effect that the former champion was laid up and that all of his engagements are off for the next six weeks at least. Young Corbett is suffering from a sprained back, two bad hands and a desire to get back on the Great White Way.

**The Canadian North-West.**

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

ENTRY.—Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is situated, receive authority for some to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

HOMESTEAD DEEDS.—A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following plans:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for their accommodation, will be accepted instead of the cultivation.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased), of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resided upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land during the term of three years. It is not to indicate the same township, or an adjoining or cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clause (2), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres substantially fenced.

The privilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completed the duties upon their first homesteads to entitle them to patent on or before the 2nd June, 1889.

Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homestead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT.—Should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

**INFORMATION.**

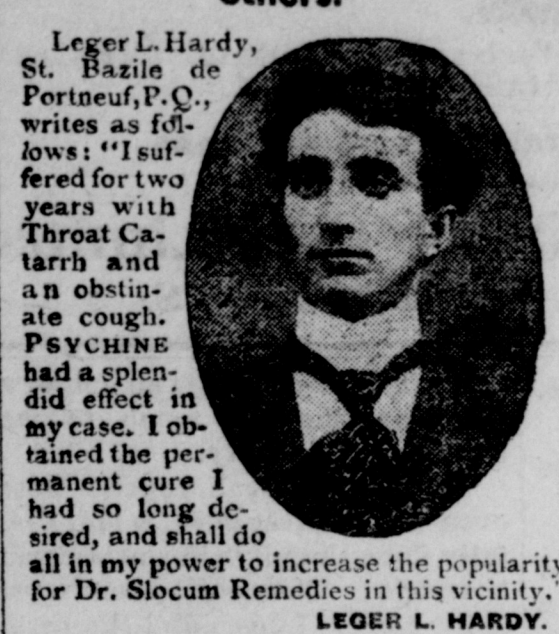
Newly arrived immigrants will receive, at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-west Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and for the officers in charge free of expense, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-west Territories.

Deputy Minister of the Interior, N. B.—In addition to Free Grant Lands, to which the Regulations above stated refer, thousands of acres of most desirable lands are available for lease or purchase from Railroad and other corporations and private firms in Western Canada.—Gmo-23.
