### HARNESS RACING.

THREE DAYS OF RACING IN EAST DURING FREDERICTON EXHIBITION.

(From the Fredericton Gleaner.)

In connection with the Fredericton Exhibition which lasts a full week this year, the Fredericton Trotting Park Association will hold a three days' race meeting on their track adjoining the Exhibition grounds.

The directorate of the Association are sparing no efforts or expense to make the meeting the most successful ever held in the Celestial City or conducted in the Maritime Provinces for many years. The executive ability and knowledge of harness racing in personnel of the directorate is such to lead one to believe that the management will be all that can be desired.

Since the last big race meeting over their track at the time of the 1903 Fredericton Exhibition, the Association have expended in a judicious manner large sums of money at their track for improvements. The track itself has been kept up to the usual standard and enough improvements made to make it as fast and well constructed a half mile oval as in the Maritime Provinces. When the horsemen arrive they will find free hay and straw and good stabling free with running water.

Horse men will appreciate the thoughtfulness of the directorate in arranging with the Intercolonial Railway for a fast freight train direct to Fredericton upon the close of the Halifax exhibition and moreover race horses entered in exhibition classes will be entitled to exhibitors' railway privileges. A change in the original entry blanks has been made so that records made at or after the opening meeting of the Maritime Circuit at Springhill on August 28th are "no bar."

### Easier to Create Than Destroy.

Halifax Herald:—It is far easier to create a new Province than to abolish an old one. Witness the tenacious survival of the Little State of Rhode Island, with its full machinery of sovereign State government, and its two United States Senators—all on a parity with the Empire State of New York. When Rhode Island ceases to be a "sovereign State" perhaps the legislative union of the Maritime Provinces may be possible.

### WHAT WAR HAS COST JAPAN.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 1.—Baron Kaneko called on President Roosevelt recently and remained in conference with him for three-quarters of an hour, returning to Oyster Bay station in time to catch the train for New York.

"No," he said, in response to enquiries, "I did not convey to the President any message from Japan or from Baron Komura."

Baron Kaneko said his visit was not made on invitation of the President, but he had simply come to Oyster Bay to talk over the situation with the President. He said he was not going to Portsmouth and had no message for the Japanese plenipotentiaries.

"What do you think of the outlook for the conference at Portsmouth?" "I know only what I read in the newspapers," replied the baron. "It looks like a deadlock."

"Japan has presented her terms. They are reasonable. They are a sort of ultimatum. Our war expenditures have amounted to eighteen hundred million yen, about \$900,000,000. We have made all the concessions; we have yielded everything to bring about peace. I think there can be no more concessions."

"Japan wants peace, but we want peace with justice. Russia wants peace with honor. Those desires are not incompatible. We may have peace yet. I hope so."

### REV JUDSON PERRY MARRIED.

Georgetown, N. Y., Aug. 30.—A very pretty wedding took place here at the home of the bride's parents on Wednesday evening, Aug. 23rd, when Rev H. Judson Perry, B. A., B. D., pastor of the Baptist churches of South Trenton and North Gage, N. Y., and Lettie Leora Andrews were united in marriage.

Mr Perry came from Johnston, Queens Co., N. B. He graduated from the Provincial Normal School in '96. He received the degree of B. A. from Acadia University in '02, and that of B. D. from Colgate University in '05. He will pursue post-graduate studies at the latter institution this coming year. He is greatly esteemed and beloved by the people of the churches over which he has pastoral oversight. He has ordained to the work of the gospel ministry shortly after his graduation from the Seminary.

Mr Perry is well known in Carleton County.

### The Bank Mill Burnt.

The mill and adjoining houses at Bridgewater, Me., owned by the Bank of Montreal, were destroyed by forest fires on Sunday. The loss is estimated at \$30,000. There was some insurance.

### A Slight Collision.

At McAdam Monday night the Boston train bumped into the train for Woodstock. The passengers were somewhat shook up, and a few received slight bruises. Sheriff Tibbitts of Andover was one of those on board.

### WHY DO THEY DO IT?

Certain maritime province weekly newspapers, and the number is not small, persist in accepting business at ruinous figures. We have in mind the case of a certain medicine house that has lately placed through a small Upper Province Agency, contracts for a service averaging from six to eight inches weekly of set matter, at the practically ruinous rate of ten dollars gross per thousand of circulation. Think of it! The averaging circulation of these papers would be less than two thousand. For the magnificent sum of fifteen dollars they will run for a whole year six or seven inches of "readers" in the very choicest position. For this service the very cheapest paper should not accept less than twenty five dollars. It is certainly discouraging for an independent publisher to be told by these people, "We do not care whether you accept our price. Your neighbor has already done so. We have made similar contracts with more than half the weeklies in your province." It is high time for the newspaper publishers in New Brunswick to get together. If some action were taken whereby a solid front could be shown when these "hold up" propositions are made, great good would result. Here in New Brunswick we need a press association. Nova Scotia already has one, and much good is resulting therefrom. At the same time we feel that newspaper publishers should be careful that they protect reputable agencies. It will never do to quote direct advertisers a lower figure than you accept through an agency. The A McKim, The Desbarats, J. J. Gibbons, and other concerns have done much for the newspapers. It is up to us to reciprocate.

Whatever Roosevelt may accomplish in his peace negotiations, he will accomplish single-handed. His late Secretary of State, Mr. Hay, is dead; and his new Secretary and possible successor in the White House, Mr. Root, is holidaying in the Lower St. Lawrence. The President is acting without official advice; and his policy and success—if he achieves one—will go down to his own credit. Theodore Roosevelt is not a man who particularly needs advice. He is not the mouth-piece of a committee nor the figure-head of an administration. He is one of the strongest personal leaders whom American politics has seen for many a day—certainly not since James G. Blaine, who was never President. Cleveland during his second term impressed his personality strongly upon his Government; but he lacked the power in the nation possessed by Roosevelt and was not even undisputed leader of his own party. Roosevelt is the Kaiser William of the United States, and is about as certain of popular support.

### The Record Wheat Crop.

The record wheat crop which is crying for harvesters in the West is wealth in the cleanest form which it can come to a people. It is not wealth taken from somebody else. It is not money borrowed and set flowing in the channels of trade, which must at some time be repaid. It is wealth created by the sunshine and the rain and nature's beneficent law of increase.

Premier Roblin puts the figures at a hundred millions. Others are more conservative; but the fact that an unparalleled crop will this year gladden the farmers and weigh down the rolling stock of the railways and tax the ability of the financiers is beyond doubt. The West has never before given us so signal a proof of her boundless ability to return to the cultivator ample rewards for his labor.—Star.

Simla, British India, Aug. 28.—The publication of a strongly-worded protest by Lord Kitchener, Commander-in-Chief of the forces in India, against the alleged misrepresentation of his views by Lord Curzon to the home Government, and a detailed reply by the Viceroy maintaining the accuracy of his statements and reiterating that Lord Kitchener's reorganization scheme would concentrate all the power at army headquarters, has created a fresh sensation and still further embittered the feeling between the two opposing factions.

### Lord Minto's New Position.

Winnipeg Free Press:—The appointment of Lord Minto to the vacant position will excite some interest and more wonder in Canada. Lord Minto was not a success as Governor-General of Canada. Of all the Governors we have had since confederation he was the only one who showed himself entirely unfitted by temperament and training for the position.

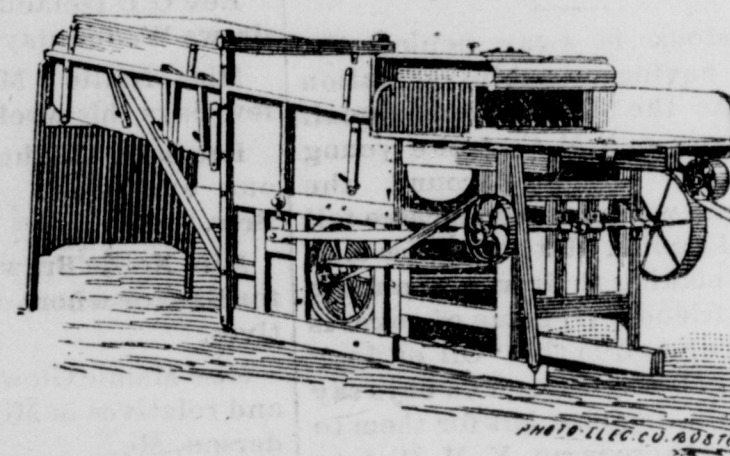

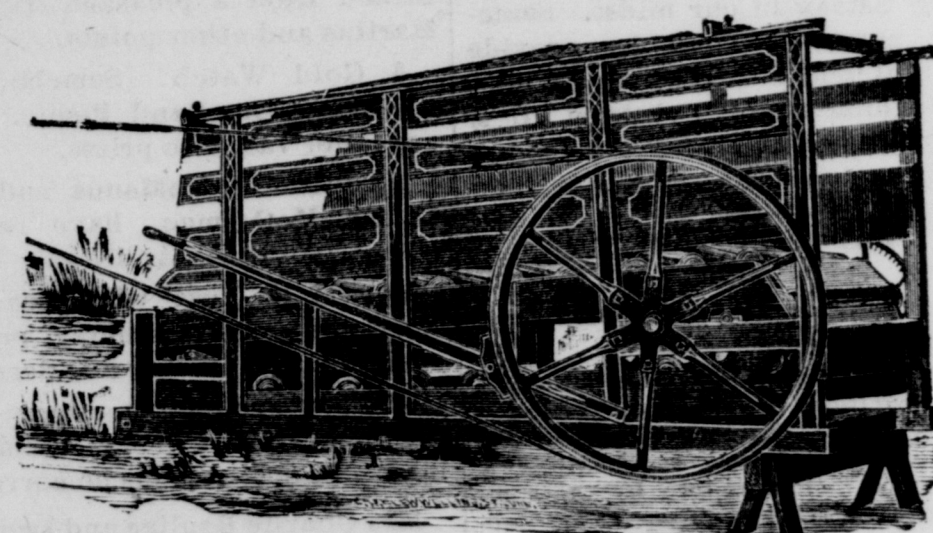
