### "We Will Be Beaten."

"I am sorry the elections were not held a year ago; we (the British Conservatives) would have been beaten, but not quite so badly as we will be when the elections do come," said Sir Gilbert Parker in a recent interview.

Sir Gilbert is member of Parliament for the constituency of Gravesend, England, and has taken an active part in British political affairs. He says he is to be opposed at the next election by a Mr McPherson, who will run as a Labor and Liberal candidate. Mr McPherson is the General Secretary of the clerks and shop employees' organization.

Sir Gilbert believes that the elections will not be held until next year although he says some event might precipitate a contest. He is of opinion that Mr Balfour will introduce a redistribution bill, to which there will be bitter opposition, and on that measure the Government may go to the country. He thinks there will be at least thirty Labor members in the next Parliament, and these, with sixty or seventy home rulers, will be the real masters of the situation for a time. He believes that in Britain no party should have too big a majority or retain office too long. In our case it is bound to have internal troubles which will end in disaster.

Sir Gilbert is now in the West attending the inaugural exercises of the new provinces.
