Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken is situate, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the missioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the District in which the land is situated, receive authority for some to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act, and the

It is the practice of the Department to require a settler to bring 15 acres under cultivation, but if he prefers he may substitute stock; and 20 head of cattle, to be actually his own property, with buildings for their ac-commodation, will be accepted instead of (2) If the father (or mother, if the father

is deceased), of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the pro-visions of this Act, resided upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of

the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead. (4) If the settler has permanent resid-

ence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the require-ments of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same township, or an ad-

joining or cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres

The privilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who

Every homesteader who fails to comply

Newly arrived immigrants will receive, at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-west Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge free of expense, advice and assistance in securing lands to suit them. Full information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Rail-way Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa; the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba; or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-west Territories.


