More About the Scott Act.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—

In reading the articles that have appeared in your paper on the question "Is the Scott Act a failure?" and being particularly interested in that topic, I shall attempt to give my opinions concerning the same.

Partially my ideas run along the same line as those in last week's paper by English Rose, only that I cannot be quite so positive that it is a total failure.

It is very true the Scott Act does not entirely prevent the sale and use of liquor, but it certainly hinders it and for the time clogs the wheels of ruin and saves many of our young men from leading a drunkard's life and filling a drunkard's grave.

Let the younger element ask their fathers if liquor can be obtained in any part of the county, especially in the town, as easily as it could prior to the Scott Act taking effect, and think well on the answer before they pass their opinion condemning the Act.

They will find that whereas once it was sold at public loss in grocery stores and elsewhere and sold openly to old or young, now it is delivered from dark corners, from cellars, by pocket peddlars and in all such way signifying the greatest secrecy. And more than that, only the very elect of the evil ones can obtain it on certain occasions, after a haul has been made. This in itself is good evidence that the Act is not a failure.

The Inspector is not properly backed up by those who profess to be temperance people. Many expect him to work and enforce the Act alone, but who will sell liquor to him? He cannot act alone. It is therefore our duty as temperance people to assist him in every way possible and not be looking so much for something to find fault about.

While speaking in favor of the Scott Act I am not satisfied by any means with the way it is carried into effect but still I don't believe in throwing it away until we have something better in sight.

For my part I would advocate Prohibition in the strongest sense of the word. I do not believe we will ever see the rum traffic brought under control any other way. But how are we to get it? Taking of a plebiscite is of no avail as has been proved to us. The temperance people will not turn out to the polls and governments will not risk their power on small majorities. No excuse is too small for them to hide behind.

My plan would be to petition the law making bodies in the following manner: Let the pastors of the different churches solicit signatures from their own congregations and those in the community who do not belong to any church but who would sign the petition, and let this plan be carried out throughout our county, province or the Dominion, and supposing the professing Christians alone signed there would be such a vast list of names rolled up that no government dare resist.
