#### SUICIDE AT MARYSVILLE.

Heart broken over the death of his fiancée and fearing that his life for the rest of his days would be unhappy without her, Howard Gailey, aged 19 years, committed suicide at Marysville Monday afternoon by shooting himself through the head. Young Gailey was the son of Mr. George Gailey, nightwatchman at the cotton mill, and a generally upright, honest and industrious young man with scores of friends.

The unfortunate young man had been very friendly with Miss Maggie Cameron, one of the most popular young ladies of the place, and their love which had started when they were small had grown deeper with age and it is said that they intended to get married in June. Miss Cameron was a sufferer from consumption and the dread disease carried her off to the great hereafter on Saturday afternoon. Since then young Gailey has been despondent, heart-broken and melancholy. He was employed in the napping room of the cotton mill, but on Friday last he left the mill.

That his desperate action was premeditated there seems no doubt as it is said that he was heard to say that he "would never live to see his fiancée buried." On Friday afternoon young Gailey drew his pay, settled some small debts that he owed and engaged a team from Morrison's Livery Stable. He drove to this city and those who saw him here remarked that he seemed very down-hearted. It is supposed that while in the city the unfortunate young man procured the weapon with which he later took his life, it being a 32 calibre Iver & Johnston revolver. Between four and five o'clock young Gailey returned to Marysville, paid for the hire of the team and went to his room at home.

At five o'clock his sister, Miss Gailey, called her father, Mr. George Gailey, to come to his supper and also called Howard to come down, but he made no response. A young lady friend of the family then went up to Howard's room and found him standing close to his bureau crying. He told the young woman that his heart was broken. Later Howard came down stairs and went to the parlor where he remained for a short time before he went to the

dining room and wiped the tears from his eyes.

A few minutes later Howard was in the kitchen sitting by the stove when his father came out now and said "Now, Howard, when the funeral is over, won't you go back to work in the napping room." He answered, "Papa, I can't tell you what I am going to do."

Mr. Gailey then left the house to go on duty at the mill at 6 o'clock and had gone into a neighbor's home when his two daughters rushed in frantically crying, "Papa, something dreadful has happened upstairs at home."

Mr. Gailey ran home as quickly as possible and went upstairs. His eldest daughter preceded him and on entering the room a horrible sight met their view, Howard was lying on the floor in front of the looking glass with a revolver clutched in his left hand and a terrible wound behind his left ear. His father said "My God, Howard, what have you done." The boy opened his eyes, gasped a few times and expired. On a chair close by was found a note addressed to his father which read thus:—

Dear Papa,—When I am dead, bury me beside Maggie Cameron or mother. Don't bury me in Gibson. I have not been feeling well for a long time. Leave my ring on my finger and you will find my cuff buttons in the vest pocket of my light suit, put them in my cuffs. Be good to the girls and Hugh.
