THE MAINE SITUATION.

The political situation in the State of Maine is an awkward one in some respects. As our readers know, the State is under total effective prohibition. By that principle the Republican party stands. Governor Cobb, the present executive head of the State, is a Republican, and a thorough-going friend of prohibition. His energy in carrying out the law has roused against him the bitter antagonism of the liquor party.

The Democratic party in Maine can hardly be said to oppose prohibition. It has made resubmission its platform. If the Democrats should carry the Legislature, they would submit to the electors the question of whether or not the prohibitory law is to be maintained. There is no doubt but that the people would vote for prohibition. Nevertheless, the Democratic party's attitude has won the strong support of the liquor party throughout the United States, and of the would-be liquor traffickers in Maine.

We have no desire to criticize men who are earnest in their desire to overthrow the liquor evil. We do not profess to thoroughly understand the objects and methods of our friends of the Prohibition Party in Maine. We simply point out the conditions that have arisen because of the third party method, and state our conviction that the situation in Maine proves the wisdom of the policy recommended by the Alliance the policy of united action to secure the nomination and election, regardless of party, of men who are known, avowed and reliable friends of prohibitory legislation.

The Third Party Prohibitionists in Maine met in convention, passed resolutions commending Governor Cobb's position and policy, and tendered him a nomination as the candidate of their party. Governor Cobb declined to accept the nomination inasmuch as he was the nominee of the Republicans. The Prohibitionists thought it wise to have a man in the field who was their own candidate, and accordingly they have nominated for governor another opponent of the liquor traffic, Henry Woodward, of Winthrop.

No one imagines that Mr Woodward has any prospect of election. It is possible that he will poll a large number of votes that would otherwise be cast for the Republican candidate; it may be that he is more loyal to prohibition than is Governor Cobb, and that, if elected, he would be even more thorough going in opposing the liquor traffic. Nevertheless, his candidature helps the liquor party.

FIELDING LOST HIS SEAT.

After nearly two years' delay in the trial of the petition against the return of Hon W S Fielding, the courts have decided that he has been guilty through an agent, of violating some of the minor points in the election law, and is therefore deprived of his seat. No personal charges were sustained. It is altogether likely the by-election in Queens-Shelburne will be brought on at once. If Mr J J Ritchie chooses to carry the warfare to any greater length there may be the pretence of a contest, otherwise an acclamation is sure to follow. In any event Hon Mr Fielding cannot be beaten. The whole affair savors of petty persecution.

Soldiers Must Be Sober.

There is now frequent official recognition of the fact that in the late war the Japanese owed a part of their superiority over the Russians to their temperate habits as compared with the drunkenness of their opponents. The matter is brought to the attention of soldiers in English training camps. A Whitby, Eng, newspaper just sent us by a friend contains the following item of military information.

The canteen of a regiment is a strange place for a temperance lecture, but such a place was recently chosen by Tynemouth Training Camp of the Yorkshire Royal Garrison Artillery by Surgeon-General G J H Evatt, who was principal medical officer in the Southern Command. He said that the extreme accuracy required by long-distance rifles and guns demanded a sober man behind them. Our soldiers should be as sober as the Japanese. He saw in Moscow that every other house was a public house, and, knowing the extreme sobriety of the Japanese, he did not wonder that the Russians were beaten by them. The Americans had abolished canteens in their army and navy and had replaced them by recreation rooms, etc, which had cost a quarter of a million pounds. "I saw," continued General Evatt, "when going to the Philippines with Admiral Dewey, the men lying on the decks reading, and I wondered at it. But Dewey said that they thus spent their time now."

Ald. W. H. Coy, of Saskatoon.

A recent number of a Saskatoon paper contains a writeup of the first city council. One member of the board is W H Coy. Of him the paper says:

William Henry Coy came from New Brunswick, and is the son of a Baptist clergyman, Rev J H Coy. He was born February 9, 1871, at Nashwaak, and was educated there and at the Collegiate at Fredericton. He started his railway career as a telegrapher on the New Brunswick railway. He rapidly rose to various positions of responsibility. In 1892 he decided to try his luck in Uncle Sam's domain and went to Boston. Remained in Boston in the railway service till 1900, when he returned to New Brunswick and accepted a position with the C.P.R. In 1903 he was appointed travelling auditor on the eastern lines. He was so successful in this capacity that he was transferred to the western division with headquarters successively at Winnipeg, Calgary and Regina. In 1905 he resigned his position on the C.P.R. to enter the real estate business, in which he has been eminently successful. In 1893 Mr Coy married Miss Ida Kilburn, of Kilburn, N.B. Mr Coy is a member of Benjamin Lodge No 31, A F & A M, Andover, N.B., and Royal Arch Chapter, Woodstock, N.B. In politics Mr Coy is a conservative.

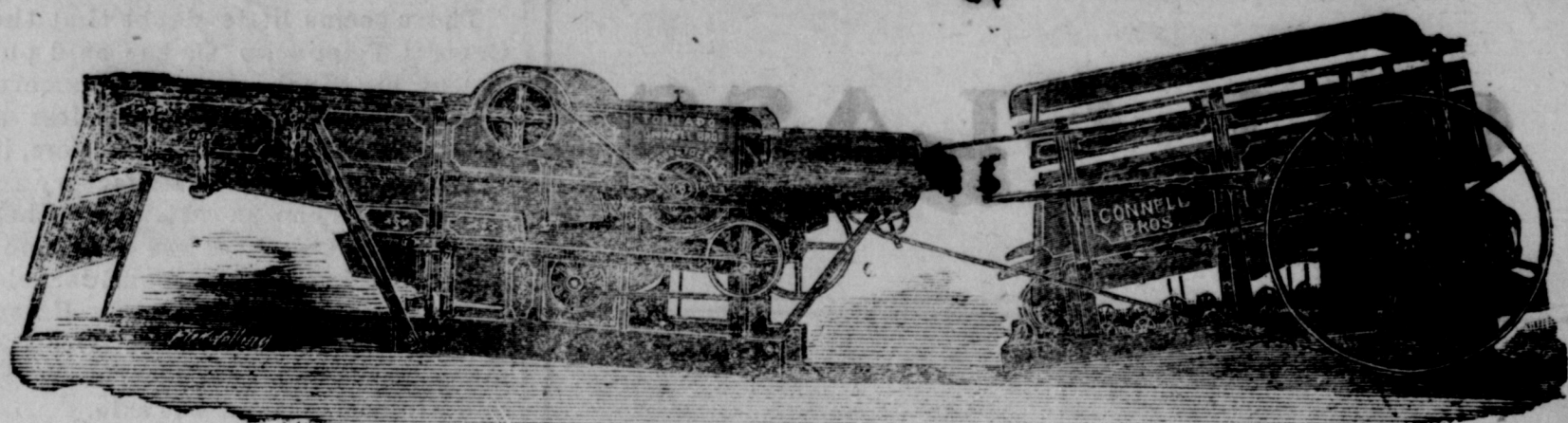
