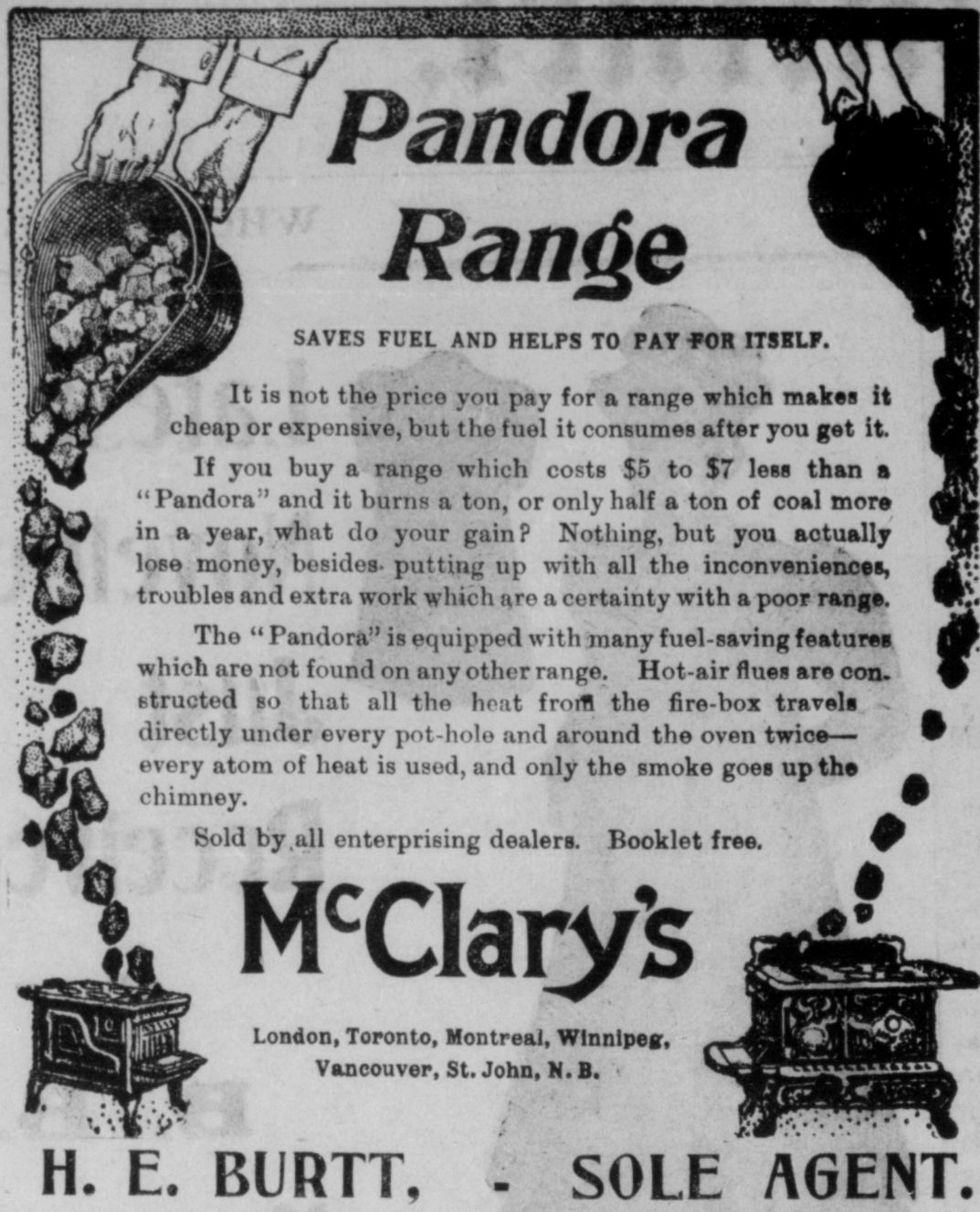

How Railway Engines Pick up Water.

LOCOMOTIVES working fast passenger trains consume from 25 to 50 gallons of water every mile they run, the quantity of water varying with the weight of the train, the state of the weather and other conditions. Hence a train used to be frequently stopped at a station for the engine to quench its thirst at a water column when, from a traffic point of view, such a stop was unnecessary. But since the introduction of water troughs on the great railways engines can pick from one to two thousand gallons of water in about fifteen seconds when running at full speed. To accomplish this open troughs about a quarter of a mile long are laid between the rails, and the tender of each engine fitted with a hinged scoop, which can be lowered so that its nose dips under and skims the surface of the water in the trough as the train travels over it, the speed forcing the water to rush up the inclined scoop into the tank of the tender. To pick up water is a simple operation, but, even to the engineers it is an exciting incident on the journey. As the train rushes along both driver and fireman are on the alert to locate the position of the troughs. This is an easy matter in daylight, but in the dark it is more difficult; they have then to be guided by some land mark, such as an overbridge, or by sound, as when the train rambles over an iron bridge. While the

driver, with his hand on the regulator, looks out ahead, the fireman watches for the trough, and the instant that the tender is over it he, with a quick turn of the handle of a screw, lowers the scoop and notes the rapid rise of the water in the tender as indicated by a gauge. He must be prompt in reversing the screw just before the tender is full, otherwise the water will spout out in great volume through the overflow pipes and flood the train. A little practice, however, overcomes this difficulty, and a skillful fireman can judge to a nicety when his tank is full.

Not all the educated boys are leaving the farm by any means. Galt, Sept. 20.—A touching instance of wifely courage and solitude and womanly courage and endurance was revealed in the case of Sophia Johanssen, a young Armenian, who applied to the chief of police this afternoon to aid in restoring her husband to her. The little woman bore in her arms an 18 months-old babe. She told a pathetic story, which affected even the big, grim policeman, as it certainly did other listeners. She was married to Franz Johanssen three years ago, in France in which country they had taken refuge from Bulgaria. Thence they came to America, and lived in New York but presently moved to Providence, R. I. Here the husband, who is an iron-worker, left his young wife and babe, and disappeared. The woman, penniless, set out to find him, and her mission led her in turn to Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton Brantford and Galt. She earned enough money working at each place to pay her way to the next. In Galt she discovered the faithless man, whom she declares she fondly loves and wishes to be reunited with. She had no clue to his whereabouts, but followed from city to city blindly but with intention that at last her search would be rewarded. Johanssen, a big, brawny fellow, would assign no reason for deserting his wife, but said he would take the infant. The mother clung to her child, and tearfully declared she would keep it. Then she pleaded softly with the great, hulking husband in Alsace French to be good to her and care for the babe. He only grunted. The man will be up before Judge Blake to answer a charge of nonsupport.

THE NEW FREEMAN'S LOGIC.

"Onlooker," the editorial writer for the New Freeman, has an article in his last number in which he tries to set us right concerning the appointment of certain senators. He says:—"Senator McSweeney was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Adams of Northumberland, and that was in no way regarded as a Westmorland appointment." Well—perhaps it was not—but it is still true that the late Senator Adams lived in Northumberland, and his successor has his home and business interests in Westmorland. Applying Onlooker's reasoning to another instance we suppose according to his way of thinking Senator Ellis' elevation could in no way be looked upon as a St. John appointment. A single step in the same direction would possibly convince "Onlooker" that Hon Mr Aylesworth is looked upon by the province of Quebec as one of its representatives in the cabinet. It is no doubt news to Senator McSweeney that he is politically regarded in the chamber and country as anything other than "the senator from Moncton."

As the Free Press correctly observes, the situation is an awkward one for the government, for Mr Fielding and for the country at large, because it is in the public interest that Mr Fielding should be his place in parliament when the House assembles in November. The revision of the tariff which cannot be further postponed conveniently, can not take place in Mr Fielding's absence. The little group of virulent politicians headed by Mr Fielding's opponent in the last election, who have brought about this state of affairs by due process of law have good reason to be jubilant at the success of their efforts to badger Mr Fielding; but they ought to know that they will have to pay a heavy price for their temporary gratification. An election in Queen's-Shelburne cannot be postponed indefinitely; and when it is held it is not probable that Mr Ritchie will be very eager to submit his claims for consideration to the electors in rivalry with those of Mr Fielding. Should he do so he will learn that his tactics have not tended to increase his popularity as a public man.

"The Free Baptist Conference of Nova Scotia which is now merged in the larger body has an honorable record. Through nearly three-quarters of a century it has moved steadily forward, maintaining the faith delivered to it, and faithfully laboring for the extension of Christ's kingdom. The movement towards union has not been hasty; every step has been well considered; and only when the brethren were satisfied that the Lord's work entrusted to them could be better carried on in conjunction with the larger Baptist body did they decide to unite. The decision when made was with characteristic heartiness. And the welcome they received from the united body is equally hearty. That this union is of God there can be no doubt. That His richest blessing may rest upon it and the united body be greatly and increasingly prospered in the work committed to it, let us all pray.

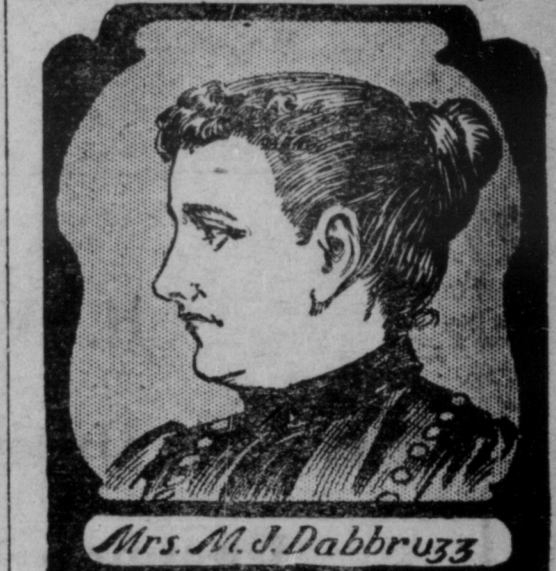
History of the Typewriter.

"The history of the typewriter is interesting," said an inventor. "The first patented machine was Henry Mill's. It was as big as a bureau and made no popular appeal. This was in England in 1714. The first type bar machine was made in America. Its inventor was A H Beach. The patent was taken out in 1856. The Beach typewriter was not practical. The first practical typewriter was invented by Latham Sholes in 1867. Sholes had for partners S W Soule and Carlos Glidden, but these two men became discouraged and dropped out. It wasn't till some years later that Sholes got his machine ready for the market. Then he took it to a big firm of gun-makers, the Remingtons, and it at once began to sell on a large scale. Sholes remained in the employ of the Remingtons up to the time of his death."

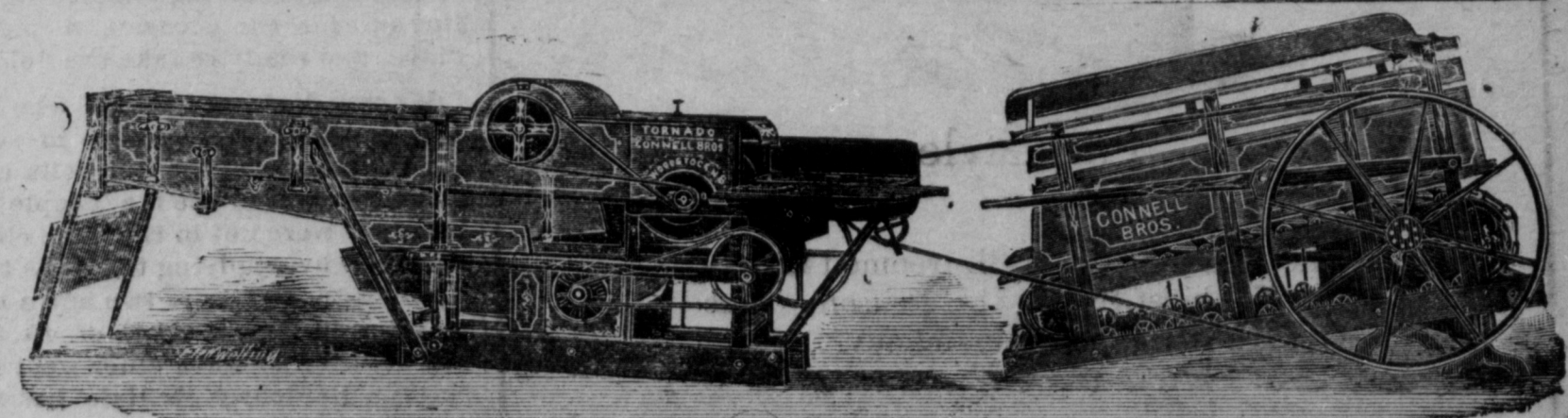
