Canada's finances for the first four months of the fiscal year make a very satisfactory showing. The revenue is increasing and the expenditure, both in revenue and capital account has decreased, the net result for the period being a betterment of about four millions and a quarter as compared with 1905. Canada is indebted to the people of Shelburne and Queens who voted to keep Mr Fielding in charge of the financial affairs of the country. He is a Finance Minister who produces results.

After one of the most exciting and animated debates in the history of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky Masons, the resolution barring liquor dealers from Kentucky was passed in slightly amended form by a vote of 418 to 32 at their council at Louisville, Ky., Oct. 18.

The amendment made the resolution even more drastic, for on motion of Grand Master Garnett, druggists were included if they sold liquor for a beverage.

Hon Frank J Sweeney, Surveyor General, was in town on Monday, and in company with Hon Mr Jones, called on several acquaintances. Although Mr Sweeney is one of the younger men in the assembly, he has an enviable reputation as a public speaker and administrator.
