EDWARD YORK.

Died at Mars Hill of pleuro-pneumonia after an illness of six days. Edward York was born at Wakefield, Dec. 20th, 1825, died April the 10th, 1906, being 80 years, 3 months and 16 days old and leaves to mourn 3 sons, 3 daughters, 43 grandchildren, 2 great grandchildren, 8 sisters, 11 brothers-in-law, 3 sister-in-laws, 38 nephews and 30 nieces.

Brother York was married in Wakefield, Car Co, to Miss Francis Gray eldest daughter of the late John Gray of Wakefield, Car Co, who preceded him to the better land 9 years ago.

Brother York has lived in this town some 46 years being one of the first settlers of this historic town. He professed religion 30 years ago and was baptised by the Rev Hammon Bubar, and added to the F W B church in this town; some 9 years ago he united with the P B church, and his christian deportment and friendship was of the nature and kind that gave him very many friends in the various christian denominations and he was widely known among the P B people and many of them knew of his hospitality and friendly greetings in his home, he had the privilege of what is the greatest boon that can come to old people and that is a home with his own son and daughter-in-law, who willingly administered to his every want. The very large attendance at his funeral bespeaks the sentiments of the community of their old and life long friend and brother. He for 60 years has been a member of the L O order he was in the ranks on that memorable 12th of July, 1847 in the town of Woodstock, he also had the opportunity of being present at the semi-centennial, 1897, as one of the veterans he has been closely identified with the order in this town for some years. The funeral services of this occasion were presided over by the writer assisted by the Rev G. M. Park, Miller and Foster, text Philippians 1 ch. 17 verse, knowing that I am set for the defence of the Gospel, subject some of the agencies employed in its defence the Orange Order especially called in question as one of the strong factors, funeral director brother Cyrus Shaw, bearers 4 of the Orange brethren, at the service in the church the order at Mars Hill was fully represented at the close of this service the Lords Prayer was repeated by the order in full, and then the casket was opened and the very large audience had the opportunity of viewing the remains of this veteran of the cross and then we repaired to the cemetery where the solemn and impressive burial service of the Order was participated in by the officers and members of this Order, an appropriate verse was sung by the writer and prayer and benediction which closed the service on this occasion, and we turned away from our dear old brother with the assurance of meeting him in the resurrection of the just in that memorable day in the near future, and from our hearts we say good bye brother, good bye father, good bye friends and neighbors.

Mayor's Proclamation.

San Francisco, April 21.—Mayor Schmitz has issued the following proclamation which citizens are instructed to observe:

"Do not be afraid of famine. There will be abundance of food supplied."

"Do not use any water except for drinking and cooking purposes."

"Do not light any fires in houses, stoves or fire places."

"Do not use any house closets under any circumstances, but dig earth closets in yards, vacant lots, using if possible chloride of lime or some other disinfectant. This is of the greatest importance, as the water supply is only sufficient for drinking and cooking."

"Do not allow any garbage to remain on premises. Bury it and cover it immediately."

"Pestilence can only be avoided by complying with these regulations."

"You are particularly requested not to enter any business houses or dwelling except your own, as you may be mistaken for one of the looters and shot at sight."

Orders are not to arrest but to shoot down any one caught stealing."

San Francisco, April 20.—The delivery of telegraphic messages from outside points to people in San Francisco, is an impossibility. The messenger service of both the big telegraph companies no longer exists. Even had the companies an army of messengers, they would be of little value for the reason that the people are scattered far and wide, and that a journey from the ferry building to the western addition or to the refugee camps consumes many hours. The only wire running out of San Francisco, that of the Postal, was accidentally cut this morning by a workman on the cable wharf, and for hours the city was again cut off.
