We have pleasure in being able to present the above cut of the new pastor of the Woodstock United Baptist Church, Rev. W. C. Keirstead, Ph. D., now of Rockford, Illinois. Dr. Keirstead is a native of this province, a distinguished graduate of the University of New Brunswick, and also of the great Chicago seat of learning. As a preacher he stands pre-eminent among the younger men in his denomination. Dr. Keirstead hopes to arrive in time to commence his pastorate a week from Sunday.

### Two Great Liberal Victories.

Tuesday and Wednesday of this week will go down in history as red letter days in the annals of liberalism. John Tolmie, liberal standard bearer in North Bruce, captured a seat from the opposition Tuesday in one of the greatest fights Ontario has ever seen, by the record majority of nearly 450. On the following day Finance Minister Fielding snowed Professor Weldon completely under in Queens-Shelburne, increasing his 1904 majority from 385 to about 1000. Both victories are remarkable ones, and can only be ascribed to the popularity of the administration. The Ontario seat was won in the general election for the conservatives by the late Mr. Leonard Bland with over a hundred majority. In the recent fight Mr. R. L. Borden went into the riding and fought might and main to hold it, but the people paid little heed to him. On the contrary they decided to throw in their lot with the party of progress. The result is a great feather in the cap of the Ontario liberal leader, Hon. Allen B. Aylesworth, Minister of Justice, who personally bore the brunt of Mr. Borden's attack. The contest is also an indication that Ontario is not by any means safely conservative, but may be depended upon to give a liberal majority at no distant date. Hon. George E. Foster in view of the recent disclosures in the Insurance Investigation, had not the temerity to go on the stump, so Billy Maclean, the erratic member for South York, was Mr. Borden's right hand man.

The great majority rolled up for the Finance Minister, though not unexpected, is specially welcome, as it is a stinging rebuke to the small calibre politicians who founded the Nova Scotian leader ever since the general contest. Professor Weldon, the strongest man they could get to face the Finance Minister, was put in the breach. His ignominious failure is striking testimony to the grasp our future federal premier, for that is what Mr. Fielding is destined to become, has on the province. Nova Scotia is a unit for Laurier, and promises to remain in that happy position. Just fancy the feelings of Mr. J. J. Ritchie and the little coterie who acted with him in the persecution! If there be a man in that whole province who should feel small enough to pass through the eye of a needle we think we could name him. Mr. Fielding goes back to Ottawa stronger than ever with his record of continuous successes unbroken. The Opposition have received two black eyes this week, and it will be some time before they recover.

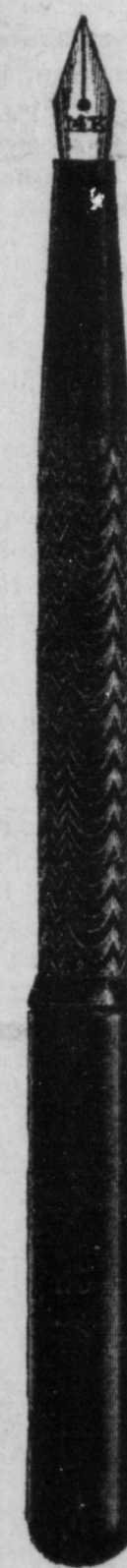
