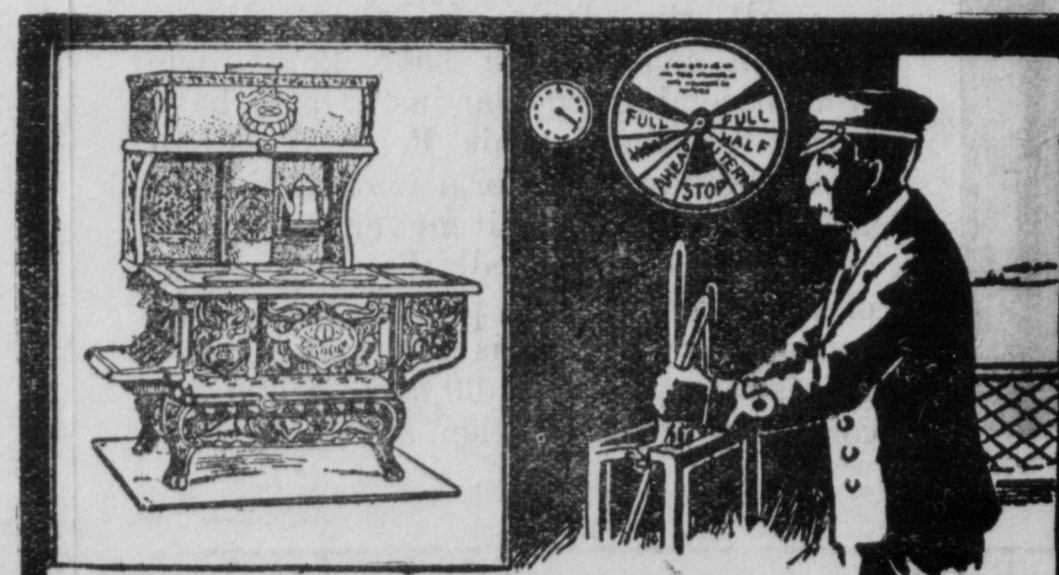

A OLEAN FIGHT.

A prominent worker from an up-river parish at present a member of the County Council told the Sentinel he heartily approves of our effort to bring about a clean, unbought expression at the polls. What's the use of giving a man \$10 or upwards for his vote when not a soul will know if he delivers the goods? Think it over, Mr. Heeler. You have played your nefarious game too long. Canada is reeking with political corruption. It is no use for the pot to call the kettle black. Both parties are dyed with bribery. Let Carleton County follow in the wake of Queens and Shelburne.

Billy McLean, conservative M.P. for South York, and about the only man of action on his side of the house from Ontario, is not one of those who preach impending disaster to the government. In his own paper, The Toronto World, Mr. McLean has this to say in explaining the conservative defeat in Bruce and Queens—Shelburne.

"However much explaining may be done, it is hard to avoid the conclusion that the Laurier government is still quite firmly entrenched in power. In the absence of any moral issue, the party in power has tremendous advantage, and it is notorious that in Canada a constituency seldom defeats a candidate who holds a portfolio in the cabinet. The net result of these elections is to lose the Conservatives one seat. The moral effect is not far-reaching, and it will enable the government, after a somewhat anxious recess, to welcome parliament, crowned with recent victory."

McLean, truthful man that he is, admits the strength of the administration. It never pays to preach deceit, and the member for South York deserves credit for his frank confession.

THE INTERCOLONIAL.

Mr. Emmerson is meeting with great success in his management of the Intercolonial railway, and his critics are silenced in the face of the excellent financial showing the road is making.

The returns of the fiscal year ending June 30th last, show a surplus of about \$200,000 which is most gratifying in view of former deficits, and there is the promise of even better things for the present year.

For July and August of the present year there is a surplus of \$160,000 and the earnings of the road for July, August and September show an increase of \$383,000 over the same months last year.

Mr. Emmerson has worked hard to accomplish these admirable results, and they are a sufficient answer to his political enemies who predicted failure in his efforts to put the Intercolonial on a paying basis.

Intercolonial deficits removed and the clamor for the sale of the road will be hushed.

Already the Toronto Globe which a year ago was leading an agitation to hand the Intercolonial over to a private company or to an independent commission, has ceased to advocate that idea, and is warmly commending Mr. Emmerson's able and business-like management of the road.—Fredericton Herald.
