The American Elections.

In the American elections held on Tuesday the Republican party managed to come out victorious in a majority of the states, carrying New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Illinois, as well as most of their other strongholds. In Rhode Island the Democrats seem to have elected their young candidate for Governor, Mayor James H. Higgins of Pawtucket, who though less than thirty years old, has beaten a Republican Governor seeking re-election. This is certainly a remarkable victory in a New England State, and stamps the Governor-elect as one to be reckoned with in future contests, if not a national figure now, he bids fair to become one. Curtis Guild seems to have had little trouble in polishing off his Democratic opponent in the Old Bay State, the dashing District Attorney Moran. In the Empire State Hughes seem to have had all he could do to whip William Randolph Hearst, the millionaire newspaper proprietor who is a perennial candidate for any fat office that may be vacant. Tammany delivered the goods sure enough but the sturdy countrymen above the Bronx took the President's advice as spoken by Secretary Root, and rolled up an old-fashioned plurality in that part of the State for the Insurance Inquisitor. The South remained Democratic by the usual pluralities. The new State of Oklahoma also went the way of its Southern neighbors. In the country over the Democrats have made gains sufficient to cut the Republican majority in congress to about fifty. With Hearst whipped, Mayor McClellan of Greater New York is safe in his seat until the close of his official term. The former had threatened to remove the mayor in case he reached the Executive Office in Albany.

#### Hunting a Crime.

In Nova Scotia deer and other big game may not be shot until Oct 1st, 1910. As a consequence they are beginning to multiply and increase in certain sections of that province. Many thinking people are urging a permanent close season. The Eastern Chronicle says:—

"God forbid that within the life time of men now living there should be an open hunting season for deer or moose. They are denizens of the forests; let them be; and partridge too. The latter are nearly extinct in Eastern Nova Scotia. As for moose the God of Nature will probably visit vengeance on the cruel and cunning bipeds who take advantage of the natural yearnings of these animals to decoy and then to murder them."

In our own province the blood money that comes into the Treasury each year from the sale of licenses, mainly to rich Americans who come down here to murder our harmless wild denizens of the forest, is a sum of which we should not be proud. We should like to see the miserable slaughter of innocents entirely prohibited. Will the carnage participated in by these ruthless "sports" continue until our noble animals are exterminated?

On the other hand, when bright, brainy men are chosen, trial by jury is just the very best men in the community are the ones to summon on our juries.
