**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST**  
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:  
(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.  
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such persons residing with the father or mother.  
(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.  
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

The action of the American Railway Association in deciding in favor of increasing from 25 cents to 75 cent the rate per day that one road must pay for the use or detention of a car of another road, will be likely, when operative to result in stopping to a very considerable extent, the present practice of railroads short of equipment preying upon the rolling stock of other roads.

At the present time it is found a very profitable practice in seasons when the demand for transportation facilities is greatest to thus detain and use the cars of other roads, as their earning value while thus appropriated many be several times the established charge of 25 cents per day.

No railroad in New England, and probably none in the county has suffered more from this sort of piracy than the B. & A. It is much better equipped in proportion to its mileage than the average railroad, but its isolated position, and its small inward traffic compared with the immense volume of its outward freight, has made it a veritable victim of this practice of car detention which the action of the Association is aimed at.—Star-Herald.

## We Need More Houses.

The crying necessity in Woodstock is for about twenty five good substantial houses, to rent at from \$125 to \$200 per annum.

Our cities, notably Toronto and Winnipeg, are breaking all records in building operations. Not only our cities, but our towns, are unnaturally distended in the effort to contain their populations, and when you meet a man from any town in the province he will tell you, if you ask, that there is not an empty house in the place, that the scarcity of houses discourages matrimony, and makes it difficult, if not impossible, to induce married mechanics to locate in the town, no matter how great the demand may be for their services. If you ask a man from one of these towns why new houses are not built to meet the demand, he will tell you that building is going on constantly, but most of the houses put up are for personal occupancy, and that men with money do not feel like putting their capital into houses for rental, at the present cost of labor and materials. It is about time, however, that people made up their minds to the fact that the cost of labor and materials will increase rather than diminish. Towns do some queer things. Take the case of a town that works itself red in the face voting a bonus to a new industry, while the manufacturer who is already there cannot get the skilled workmen he needs, and cannot bring them from outside because there is not an empty house in town. The place needs new houses—our town needs a Building Committee to induce its men of means to put up roofs for the growing population to shelter under.

Half the towns in the province are being strangled by wealthy citizens whose only idea of a safe investment is a first mortgage on a farm property at six per cent.

They live in the town, but on the county. Yet the time has come in many places when these men could get larger incomes from houses rented or sold than from money loaned on farm mortgages. Strangers will loan money on land. The local man ought to be able with perfect safety to himself to build up the town and profit in its progress.

Which of our wealthy citizens will set the ball rolling?

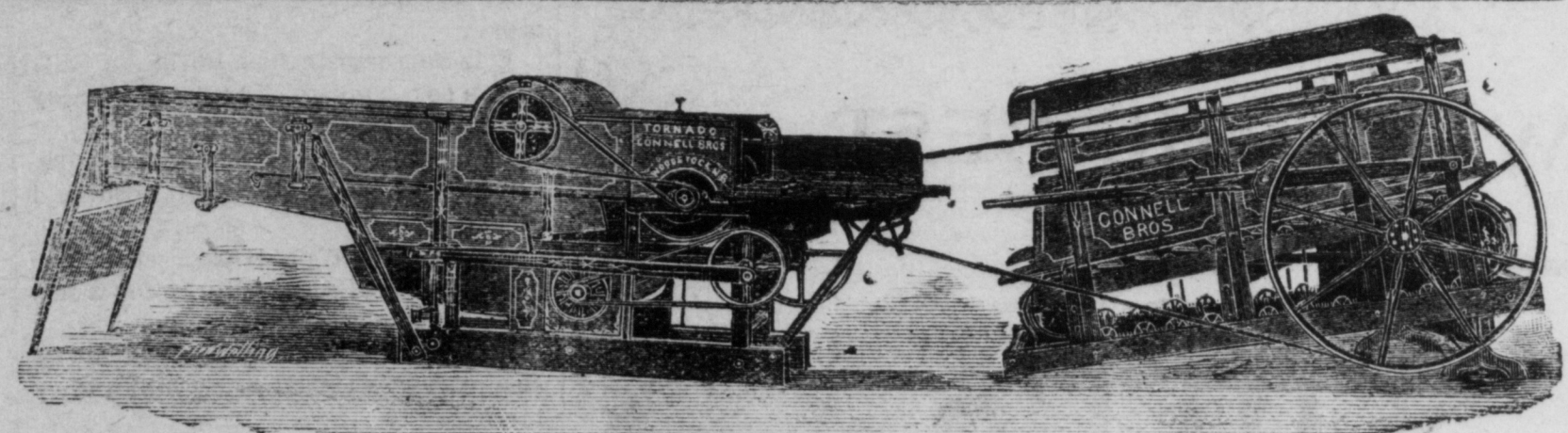
