There is no doubt that the timely intervention of the Bank of Montreal in the affairs of the Ontario Bank averted what might have turned out a very serious financial panic, though at no time was there any fear of the depositors and noteholders losing anything. They were fully secured by the admirable banking system of Canada. Under it the note circulation of all the banks in the Dominion is guaranteed by a fund held by the Government to which all the banks contribute. In the event of a bank failing or suspending, its bills are at once redeemable by the Government. This was rendered unnecessary in the case of the Ontario Bank, since its bills or notes were received by the Bank of Montreal, which then destroyed them and substituted notes of its own. This prevented any lengthened "run" on the Ontario Bank. When the news of the trouble first became public there was a slight run at its head office in Toronto, as well as on its twenty-two branches throughout Ontario and Quebec, but when the depositors called there and saw "Bank of Montreal" pasted over the name of the troubled institution they were nearly all at once satisfied, only a few timid ones withdrawing their money, simply to deposit it in the regular branches of the big bank.—Scottish American.
