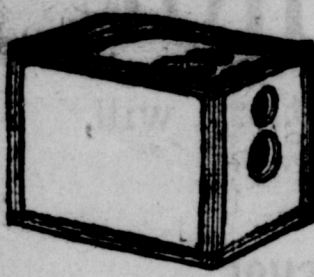

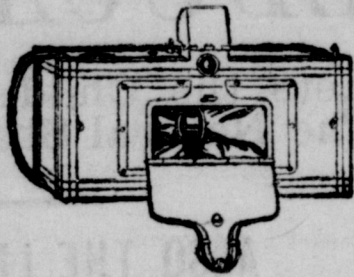

TOWN COUNCIL.

At the Town Council on Monday evening all the members were present except the Mayor, who is still laid up at home. Coun Henderson who is getting pretty well used to the chair, again adorned the position. In the early part of the meeting a delegation composed of County Councillors Flemming, Phillips and Forrest spoke against the town by-law which imposes a license upon County residents who may come into town to work. At the request of the Chair, Mr Hartley informed the delegation that the town had no power to exempt the County residents. The license must be against all non-residents, or else be ultra vires. This apparently satisfied the County fathers, and they withdrew.

Considerable time was taken up in a squabble over sewers and the lighting question. Couns Dunbar and Fisher gave their reasons for not appearing at the last meeting of the board. Coun Fisher had two engagements and could not break them. Coun Dunbar sailed into Coun Fields in lively fashion. There is evidently bad blood between several members this year. In the matter of lighting the Town it was ordered after a long debate, that an expert be brought here to go into the whole question of lighting and pumping. Engineer Barbour undertakes to furnish the information at a small charge and he will be secured.

MR. L. GORDON GLASS.

Of the younger members of the legal profession in Montreal, none, perhaps, have been more generally successful, or more widely known, than Mr L Gordon Glass, of the firm of Glass and Surveyer. Born in Woodstock, N B, he is a son of Rev Charles Gordon Glass, the founder of Glassville, N B. His legal studies were pursued at McGill University, and after graduation he became a partner in the firm of Greenshields and Greenshields, where he remained for about two years. He afterwards practised alone for a time, and about two years ago entered partnership with Mr Surveyer as senior member of the firm.

One of Mr Glass' most noted cases was that of Mrs Slater, with whose defence he was associated.
