THE OTTAWA ENQUIRY.

Mr. Jury, who is giving rather picturesque if not convincing evidence before an investigating committee at Ottawa, seems to be principally interested in injuring Mr. Preston, who is doing Canada such excellent service at London as head of the Immigration bureau.

Mr. Jury got it into his head that Mr. Preston was personally making a big thing out of the North Atlantic Trading Company business and he wanted to get a slice. He didn't get in and so he started for Mr. Preston's scalp, even securing possession of private letters to help him in his effort to discredit Mr. Preston.

Mr. Jury is not ashamed to confess to the committee that he took these letters from the pigeon holes of the Allan line agent's office at Liverpool, and the Tories are not ashamed to make use of the same letters to prejudice Mr. Preston, and the government which employs him.

No evidence has been submitted to prove that Mr. Preston was connected with the company or that he has made money improperly or at all outside his official salary, and while his straightforward evidence has made a good impression even on the Tory members of the committee, as admitted by the Toronto World, Mr. Jury's must have struck the committee as peculiar and imaginative.

Without attempting to prejudice Mr. Jury, it would seem from what has occurred that he would be a very good man to discharge from the government service.

The kind of a man Mr. Jury is, is illustrated in the following short extract from his evidence before the committee.

"Mr. Jury said he took Preston's letters to Ennis, the Allan agent at Liverpool, from Ennis' desk. Ennis turned his back and told him to do it. He wanted to have the letters to injure Preston with the labor interests in Canada by showing that Preston was willing to arrange for skilled workmen to come to Canada. He had the letters copied and photographed and had slipped them back into the desk as he got them. He gave the letters to W. L. Griffith, Lord Strathcona's secretary, to help him in his fight against Preston."

Mr. Carvell asked what grievances witness had against Mr. Preston, and he said the latter had kept him short of money and he found fault with him for charging first class fares when he travelled third class.

"As a matter of fact, you did that?"

"Yes."

"And got the money for it?"

"Yes."

The committee meetings grow quite torrid occasionally, and Friday's feature was a brief but lively clash between Col Sam Hughes and our own Mr. F. B. Carvell.

The man who put an end to the Boer war, and lived to write the full details of his glorious achievements on the South African veldt ran up against the wrong man when he attempted to bluff and browbeat Mr. Carvell, whose excellent fighting qualities are so well known. Mr. Carvell does not claim to have captured Cronje, but he was just about one minute in suppressing the bumptious Col Hughes.—Herald.

THREE DAYS OF RACING AT ST JOHN EXHIBITION.

A Handsome Cup for the Best Driving Horse—Dog Show to be in a Big Tent—Prize offered for Vegetables.

The prospects for a great St John exhibition fall are increasing every day. Mr. Milligan, manager of the exhibition, announced that Geo. McAvity had donated an elegant silver cup to be given as a prize for the best carriage horse, bred and owned in the province. W. A. Burpee, of Philadelphia, has offered a prize of twenty dollars for the best exhibit of vegetables grown from seeds purchased from his firm. Mr. Milligan also reports that he is receiving most encouraging reports from the automobile, carriage, and motor boat companies, and that as a result the exhibits along these lines will be much finer than was first anticipated.

The dog fanciers are taking up in earnest the question of holding a dog show in connection with the exhibition, and have expressed themselves agreeable, to holding that exhibition under canvas. The holding of this exhibit under canvas was considered the greatest drawback towards having the dog show, but the owners and exhibitors have expressed themselves as agreeable, as it is so early in the fall.

The exhibition committee have completed arrangements with R. J. Armstrong for the loan of his large tent for that exhibit.

A communication has been received from Fred G. Spencer stating that he will be able to make an offer concerning the amusement hall features and no action will be taken until his arrival.

The horse racing committee have finally decided to hold races during the exhibition week. They will hold races for three successive days and will offer very large purses and as a result they expect to have some of the fastest horses not only from Canada, but from United States. They will also arrange to have the horses which will race at Halifax come to the St John races.

REVIEWING THE PAST.

In the church work of to-day we have ample opportunity to look back and review some of the workers of past days and in the deepest of sympathy and gratitude of our hearts we confer on them the most pleasant of memories for their indomitable courage and faith. While we call up this question of their great zeal for the perpetuating of the christian faith and freedom of thought for future generations, we would be perfectly safe in giving due notice to some of them who have lived and laboured in the early days of our first memories, and while we call them into thought, we have such remembrances of them that we almost hear them speak in an audible voice so conscious are we of the heritage that they left us. They were so full of faith in the great accomplishment and effectual fulfilment of the mission of the gospel and were so enthused with their work of propagating to the coming generations, yet to be saved, in all time to come, for a moment we pause and listen for an answer from this present generation and then we ask this question "are we doing with our far advanced privileges and seemingly better opportunities as good work as those we refer to?"

Will this generation applaud and honor our memory as we honor the memories of those men of God in the past generation? That will all be owing to what we are worth in the cause of our Redeemer. The diligent hand maketh rich. Our fathers have left us in reach of the greatest treasure that is possible to achieve in this life. Are we reaching up and out for them or are we not? The most of men are diligent in business, some are present in spirit, but are we serving the Lord. The Lord's service requires something more than our own ease and world comfort. Service meant something to the followers of Jesus in the early or primitive days and it means some sacrifice to day if we do all that is required of us as christian churches. Now if we are prayerful enough and devoted as we ought to be we will have very little trouble to find what service is required of us. Minister or layman, idleness finds no job, closed eyes sees no opportunity, deaf ears hears no call; church members of this special variety have a small heritage to their successors. The plot in the vineyard that they are supposed to work is so much neglected that the fruit for the great harvest is an abundance of the wrong. Find some of the churches recorded in the Revelation are not an up to date lot and we presume that if some proper investigator such as judged them were given an opportunity of judging some in the present day we would get just about the same record.

Primitive Baptists we are nearing our yearly meeting; look back for thirty one years then we had seven churches for our first yearly meeting we organized with five ministers and fifteen messengers. Now we number 54 churches, twelve ordained ministers, five Licentiates, 9 of our ministers have died and 2 expelled showing to us most conclusively that some of our sturdiest men are gone from us, but we have no cause for complaint along this line—what is our loss is their great gain.

Our work is not yet done we are here for work not ease; the resting time is just in the near future. Are we a cuping to our great good for ourselves and our surroundings? This is the matter that ought to concern us most. Not only once in the year do we need to review but it is well for our spiritual health to keep this question well in mind and near at hand for it often proves very helpful to christian work and an especial boon to those that we live among. The best resolves have been the fruit of careful review of our lives. We hope for much, we expect much for God's people if they do His will. Let us all try to sow some good seed; this is seed time—the harvest cannot fail if the seedling is properly attended to in the seedling time. What might result have come from feeble efforts. Move on ye hosts of our Redeemer until the setting sun.

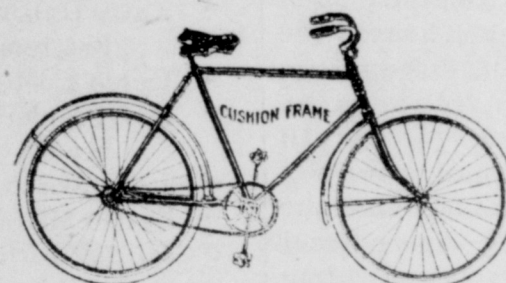
