## A New Court House.

This is a live, a very live issue.

Before the month has expired the verdict will be given.

What will the decision be?

Will it proclaim that Carleton County is the equal of any adjoining county or state?

The alternative is very distasteful. We don't like to contemplate, much less mention it.

In this affair the best common sense is allied with true patriotism.

Have you common sense and are you a patriot?

Be your sentiments what you may, by your acts we judge you. If you are not with us the inference is unmistakable.

There is not a judge or a lawyer who would invite a visiting brother to our court house. Why? Because he would carry away a false impression of our people, their aims and aspirations.

### THE PROPOSITION.

Irrespective of the question of cost, and purely as a matter of local pride, we claim that a court house should be built at once. Yet the question of expenditure cannot be overlooked. We would not be discharging our duty to the public if we attempted to be little the debt that it entails, or failed to point out the ways and means by which we conceive that it can be met.

We have the land. The site, therefore, involves no outlay; and the situation is, for the purpose, of the choicest kind. A first class building can be erected for \$20,000, but it would be non-producing. One can be built for \$30,000, the rooms on the first floor of which, together with those on the second floor of the registry office building, can be made to net a yearly revenue of at least \$500. This is a conservative estimate. It means ten suites of office rooms (two rooms to a suite) at \$100 per annum. We say "net" because \$30 more, per suite, can be charged for the heating, or \$300 a year. This amount will be ample to pay for the heating of the court room in addition to the offices. By this means the heating of the whole building costs the county nothing.

The cost of the building, \$30,000 can be borrowed at 4 per cent making a yearly interest charge of \$1200. This will leave a deficit of only \$200 and a janitor's salary. From that deduct the cost of heating the present building for court and council purposes, the cost of keeping the building clean—now done in a most slipshod manner, the cost of horse hire for sheriff and judge, the cost of conveying prisoners—including team and extra officers required—from the gaol to the court house and back again, the extra allowance on account of the present situation now made to all witnesses in crown cases and which the county has to pay, and you will have reduced the annual burden to be borne by the taxpayer to a minimum; in some years, perhaps, wiped it out altogether.

These figures are not fancy; they appeal alike to the intelligence of the council and the electors.

#### Sam Hughes Squelched.

One of the most arbitrary and domineering men in the Commons is Colonel Sam Hughes M. P. for Victoria & Haliburton, Ontario. The gallant Colonel went to South Africa at the time of the Boer war and made himself an object of ridicule by the wonderful letters he sent home describing his exploits on the field of battle. In the house he has brought upon himself the cordial dislike not only of his political opponents but of a large section of the conservative party as well. His favorite method of warfare in the Commons is to act the bully, and it must be said that up to a certain point he played the game very well. Alas for the Colonel, however, he struck a snag on Friday last, and greatly to the comfort and amusement of the whole house, our member Mr. Carvell, put the Colonel in his proper place, and did it in no uncertain manner. It happened in the Agricultural Committee where the investigation into the North Atlantic Trading Co was going on. Mr. Carvell was watching the examination of a witness pretty sharply and when the warlike Colonel got outside the bounds of fair play Mr. Carvell called a halt. Sam Hughes resorted to bluster and accused Mr. Carvell of the very crime which the member for Carleton accused him of committing, asking unfair questions—Mr. Carvell at once firmly denied the charge and challenged Hughes to prove his slanderous statements. The Colonel, who is big and athletic, began to shake his fist at Mr. Carvell, but soon found he was playing with a more than usual opponent. Mr. Carvell told him he was barking up the wrong tree when he tried to scare or bluff him. He said he was in no way afraid of the Colonel and would rather welcome extreme measures, but would first advise Hughes to sit down and keep his mouth shut. Colonel Sam saw at once he had mistook his man, and collapsed into his seat. It is pretty safe betting that Sam Hughes will keep pretty clear of our member in future. He will do well to keep his jaws together pretty close whenever the member for Carleton is within hearing. Needless to add the whole House more than enjoyed the fall of the mighty Colonel.

#### CALGARY.

Through the courtesy of W. A. N. Connell, one of the smart and prosperous Woodstock boys in the west we have received a copy of a booklet issued by the board of trade of that city. The place seems prosperous enough, wages are from \$3.00 to \$4.00 a day. Food and clothing are a little more expensive than here, and rents are decidedly so. A five room house costs from \$12.00 to \$16.00 per month, and a seven or eight room flat is worth \$30.00 per month in central locality.

#### Why the Jury Paid the Fine.

A Texas correspondent tells how an obstinate jurymen was circumvented by his fellow-judges of the facts. The offense charged was assault with intent to murder. After the jury had been out about two hours it returned the following verdict: "We, the jury, find the defendant guilty of aggravated assault, and assess his punishment at \$25 fine, and herewith pay the fine."

On inquiry as to the meaning of the last clause of the verdict it came out that eleven of the jurors had agreed that the defendant was not guilty, but the twelfth doggedly hung out for a conviction for aggravated assault, and would not consent to a punishment less than a fine of \$25. Finding it a hopeless task to bring over the obstinate one to their way of thinking, the eleven finally decided to agree with him, and chipped in enough to pay the fine.—Law Notes.

#### The Automobile and the Horse.

The automobile has not discouraged the useful animal, the horse. Official reports show that the equine is still paramount. In 1905 there were 17,057,702 horses in the United States, against 14,213,837 in 1890, notes the Cincinnati Enquirer. The export price averaged \$308.99 last year, against \$174.50 in 1892. The horse is flesh, blood and intelligence, and people of natural and practical predilections can have an affection for him. He has the graces of instinct, and if he gets proper attention is a thing of beauty and satisfaction. The spread of the automobile is amazing, but it is still, to a great degree, a fad and a toy.
