THE ST. JOHN BRANCH LINE RESTORED.

In the railway debate in the Commons on Monday afternoon Mr Carvell scored an almost unprecedented victory in that he was able to carry his point against a minister of the crown. The matter of a branch of the G T P from some point on the main line to St. John was under consideration. The minister of Railways considered that the original act fully covered the case and bound the company. Mr Carvell took the opposite view and held that moral obligations are not over-binding on corporations. He insisted upon having this branch put under the jurisdiction of the company that is being incorporated to build the branches. Mr Emmerson replied, and Dr Daniel spoke in favor of Mr Carvell's contention, after which Mr Carvell's amendment was carried on division, 44 to 20.
