Mr Hartley, although beaten in the last election, had little to be ashamed of. He did not send out a circular letter appealing for votes because he lived in a particular section of the county, neither did he work the society racket on every liberal or doubtful voter belonging to any lodge with which he might be affiliated. Of course he may get elected next time but he will require four or five hundred more votes than either Smith or Flemming will get in order to keep within hailing distance of the Solicitor General.

At Toronto people can see the smallest complete steam engine of any kind probably ever constructed. It is smaller than a common house fly and it weighs only four grains troy; that means that it takes 120 engines to weigh one ounce, 1920 to the pound and 3,840,000 engines to the ton. Stroke, one-thirty second of an inch. The speed of this engine is 6000 revolutions per minute and the horse power one four hundred and ninety eight thousandths part of a horse power. This minute piece of mechanism is made of gold and steel of 17 pieces and will be found in the centre of the manufacturers building, Toronto.

Canadian Pacific engineers have begun the survey of the extension of the Temiskaming Railway, which branches from the main line at Mattawa. The work has been started at Temiskaming station, and will proceed northward along the shore of Temiskaming Lake to Opemicon. At this point the higher level is taken. Ostensibly the line is intended to terminate at Vill Marie, about 50 miles up Lake Temiskaming, but the objective point undoubtedly is much further on, namely, the line of the National Transcontinental Railway. The railway is being built under the charter of the Temiskaming Colonization Railway Co., which is now owned by the C P R.
