These facts were also proven in the trial of the action in the Supreme Court. 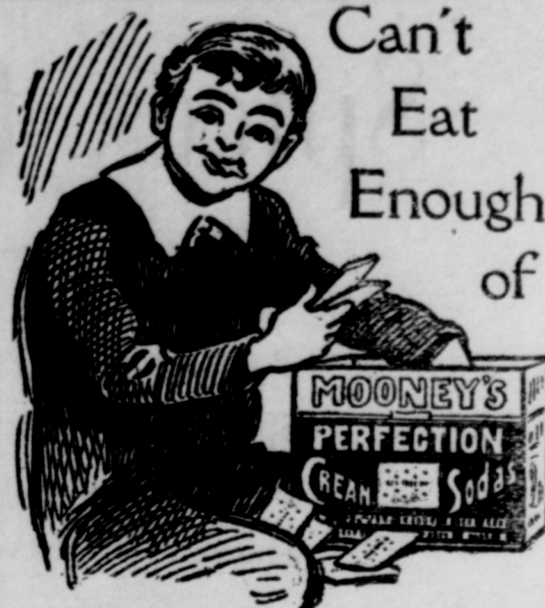
George McLeod of Farmerston wishes to dispose of his place.

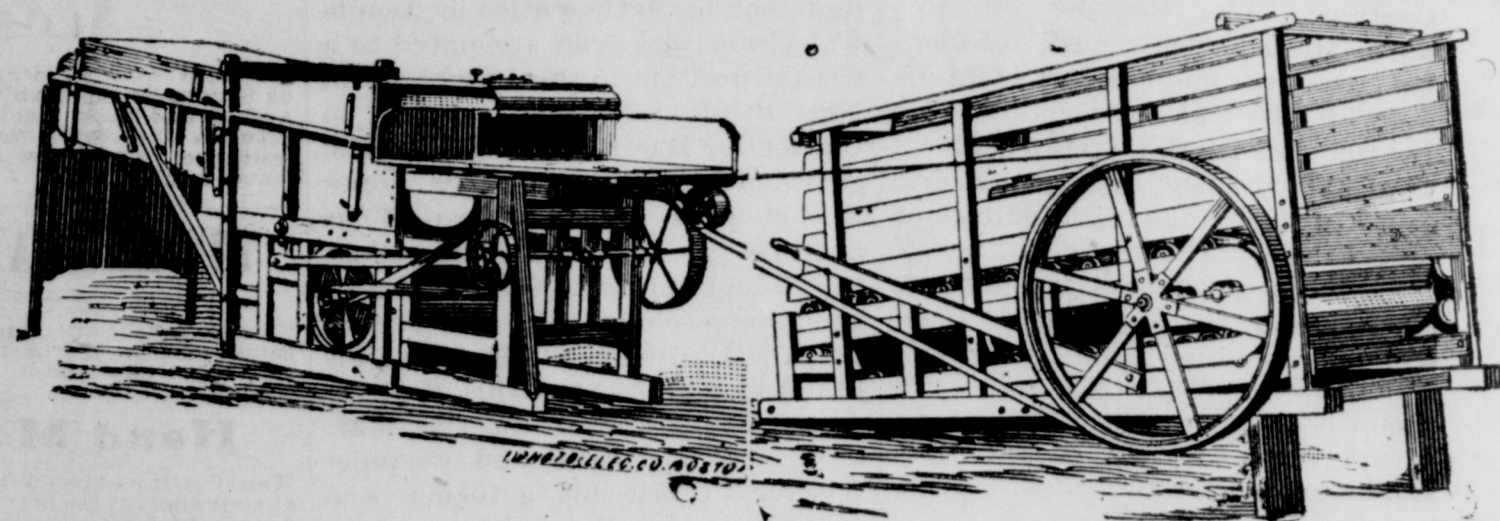
