Easily Managed When Massed Together—Some Have the Evil Eye.

In Spain accidents to bull fighters are of frequent occurrence, and it is interesting to see the hero of many fights swing into the chapel attached to the bull ring and kneel before the effigy of the Virgin Mary before entering the arena.

Bull fighting is the national pastime. Boys play at it in the gutters, and there are bull fights for amateurs all over the country, at which only two-year-old bulls are used, and young and old descend into the arena. Astounding is the enthusiasm.

Interesting, too, is the psychology of bulls. When herded together they are docile enough, and it is a picturesque sight to see the bulls brought into the paddock prior to the fight, through the streets of the city when all are sleeping. A cow trained to the business with a bell around her neck, is all that is necessary, and the bulls follow quietly behind her.

In the plains where the bulls are reared men on horses manage them quite easily so long as they are massed together. Three bulls in the ring together would be useless for a fight, but each bull separately will fight to the death.

Bulls literally see red. Were it not that a bull will always dash at anything red the men in the ring would have no chance whatever. Occasionally bulls have what is called the evil eye, and remain indifferent to the red cape extended to them, and then the list of casualties is generally high.

Sometimes a bull which has shown prodigious power and fight is pardoned by the populace. A cow kept for the purpose is then sent into the arena and at sight of her the bull forgets man and the fury of the battle and gently trots behind to the paddock as meek as any heifer.

Many are the curiosities about bulls which sometimes refuse to attack a particular horse, and when a man is down, motionless, disdain even to paw him. Some bulls make instinctively for one man, and will chase him. All around the ring, leaping the barrier if he vaults over it and if he falls will kneel upon his body and gore him to shreds. There is no mercy in bulls and none is shown to them.

REAL POVERTY.

There is a poverty far worse than the want of the goods of the earth. It is the want of noble emotion for noble things; the want of love and, therefore, of the pursuit of ideals which are beyond our present reach; the want of the power of seeing beauty, of admiring it, or of loving it if seen; the want of imagination; inability to reverence, to admire, to enjoy; the poverty which is the absence of those capacities whereby we are ravished out of self and its desires into the worlds which are beyond all knowledge, those high and noble regions where dwell ideas and their forms which many call unreal, but which are, in reality, the substance of the shadow-world in which we think we live. This is a terribly poverty, and it pervades all classes. This, in all its forms, is the worst poverty which besets the modern world.—Dr Stopford Brooke.

In referring to Prof Cecil C Jones, Ph.D., whose name is mentioned in connection with the chancellorship and the chair of mathematics, Rev J H MacDonald said: "Prof Jones has made a great name for himself at Acadia. He is regarded as a superb teacher and disciplinarian, and has since the retirement of Dr Trotter been registrar of the university, which involves much of the executive and administrative care of the institution. In addition to his work at Harvard, he was two or three years ago granted a year's leave of absence which he spent at the University of Chicago, pursuing special studies. Previous to that he was offered the chair of mathematics in Colby University, Waterville, Me., but owing to the transition through which Acadia was then passing he was induced by President Trotter to decline the appointment. Prof Jones is not only an ideal college man, but is a man of affairs as well. He is a strong moral force in the community life and has developed to a good degree the gift of public address. He represented Acadia at the educational meeting of the Baptist convention held this week in Liverpool, N. S., and made a fine impression. Dr Jones is a native of Westmorland Co., and married Miss Baird, sister of Rev Frank Baird, of Sussex, N. B. His name has been mentioned also in connection with the presidency of Acadia, but that office has always been held by a clergyman and it is said there is a disposition on the part of governing board not to break the line of succession.

Margaret Anglin's Famous Monolog in Zira.

Did you ever dissect the climatic speech of a big dramatic scene? It is a curious fact that the best acting bits of this sort are positively incoherent when put in cold type. The actress fills in so many gaps when reading a speech of this sort that you don't realize how little has been required to thrill you—nothing, in fact, but earnestness, cumulative power and the force of repetition. Here, for example, is the monolog from "Zira" which placed Margaret Anglin in the first rank of American stars one night last autumn:

"Every word that she said was true: every charge she made against me just. I am what she called me, a cheat and a thief. I am Hester Trent. I know that I'm not fit to lift my head before you. I know there isn't anything I can do or say now to undo the wretched thing that I've done; but, oh, can you think what it means to have yearned for happiness all your life long, to have found it suddenly within your grasp and then to have seized blindly as I did? Can you think what it means to have been dragged up from your babyhood by a father who hated you, to have been hungry and cold and ragged and beaten, and to have run away from all with a man just because he spoke a few kind words to you, too young to know that you were only being taken from misery to shame to awake to the cruel truth of that before you were 16 years of age, and then to be told by the world that all the rest of your long, miserable life must be lived as an outcast; to battle beyond your courage and beyond your strength against the sneers and the taunts and the mockeries: to fight for a decent place in the world, and to try to work and be kind and to be good, only to be beaten back again and again and again, and then to have been tempted as I was; to hear the surgeon say that the woman was dead; to know that there was a home waiting somewhere, a home that I could have—I'd never had one; to know that there was love and friendship somewhere that might be won? I'd never known them—and, oh, I wanted,—oh, I wanted them so much that I just did it; I just came, and night after night since I've been here I've lain awake, with the words 'you cheat, you cheat!' burning themselves into my heart, and beating themselves into my brain, until I'd get down on my knees and I'd pray until morning came for courage to tell the truth, to tell you who I was and what I'd done, but it wouldn't ever come."

To Lady Clavering: I could only think of all that you were to me. I never knew my own mother, and I'd found you the dearest, tenderest mother that God ever made.

To Clavering: I never had a friend in all my lonely life until you took my hand, and so I clung to you in fond hopes with all my wretched strength and now I'm here a beggar at your feet! I'm not asking you to pity me, because I know I don't deserve it. I'm not asking you to forgive me, because I know you never can do that.

I'm just begging you not to hate me if you can help it.

Will you? Because, bad as I am, I have loved you so. Don't hate me—don't! don't!
