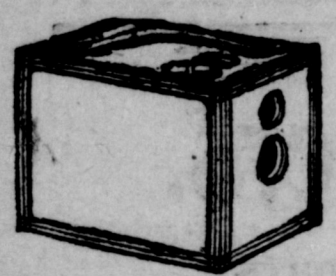

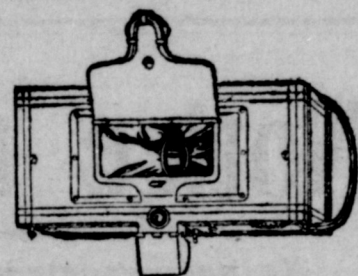

Carvell Is Active At Ottawa.

Our able and popular member is taking a lively interest in the business at the capital, in fact he has been doing almost the lion's share of the work in the committee on Agriculture where the investigation into the charges against Mr Preston has been going on. F D Monk, one of the opposition leaders has been trying to make capital out of the evidence of one Alfred Jury, a man who admits he is an enemy of Preston, and who refuses to take an oath. Naturally Mr Carvell with his trained legal acumen watches pretty carefully the evidence of such witnesses. Just a week ago to-day Mr Jury was on the stand and began by withdrawing the statement made a week before that he had approached Mr Macdonald and asked him to ask him certain questions. Mr Monk then took up the witness and asked what application he had made to get into the North Atlantic Trading Company, and he replied by reading his letter to Mr Preston, in which he referred to "two gold mines," and wanted to know if there were any shares for sale.

"Then you meant it as a joke when you said you had applied?"

"Most decidedly."

Mr Monk asked if the relations between Mr Preston and the other agents of the Government in the British Islands were good. Mr Jury said that they were not good. Mr Monk asked him to tell them all about it.

Mr Carvell—What you know of your own knowledge.

Mr Jury—What I know is from hearsay.

There was a sharp discussion between Dr Sproule, Mr Carvell and Mr Monk as to whether or not Mr Jury should give what he merely heard as evidence, Mr Carvell maintaining that he should not.

"There is one thing that I do know—Mr Preston advises the agents without giving them their official status," said Mr Jury.

"That is quite right," replied Mr Carvell. "Go on and tell us what you know."

Mr Derbyshire—There was a little vanity in that.

Mr Jury—On both sides. He merely mentioned me as "A F Jury, Castle building, Liverpool," without showing that I was a government agent.

Mr Monk asked Mr Jury why Mr Preston, who was a Government official, had such an interest in the Labor Bureau.

Mr Carvell objected to this question. How could Mr Jury know what was in Mr Preston's mind in respect to a matter of that kind? Dr Sproule and Mr Monk considered the question a proper one. The committee was desirous of knowing all that they could on the subject. Mr Macdonald (Pictou) said that there was little use of asking Mr Jury of his opinion about Mr Preston because they all knew Mr Jury's opinion of Mr Preston. Asked as to the relations between them, Mr Jury said that they were not friendly.

AN EFFORT TO GET THE FACTS:

The Chairman, after a wrangle, in which the members took part, decided that it would be better to get the facts in the case, as the opinion of Mr Jury of Mr Preston was of no consequence.

Mr Monk—So you rule the question out of order?

The Chairman—Yes.

Mr Monk moved that the evidence of Mr Jury be at once reported to the House. He contended that it had been disclosed that Mr Preston had encouraged through the Canadian Labor Bureau emigration to Canada of a class that was inimical to the interests of the working classes. Therefore the evidence should at once be placed before the House in order that it might take immediate action to protect the interests of Canadian labor classes in connection with immigration.

Mr Carvell pointed out that under the evidence it was shown that Mr Jury and Mr Preston were not friendly, and that Mr Jury had drawn an inference which was a matter for the House to draw from the evidence.

A heated argument ensued between Mr Blain and Mr Carvell, arising from a remark by the latter that he was a politician, but the difference between him and Mr Blain was that he was honest about it and that gentleness was not. Mr Blain demanded protection from the chair. Mr Carvell, after affirming his position, withdrew the words that were objectionable.
