## "WILL THE COUNCIL RECTIFY THE WRONG?"

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—Whereas Councillor Alex. Bell has failed to explain to the ratepayers of this county why he seconded the motion of Councillor Carvell to confirm Messrs. Brown and Phillips in their seats at the council he being a member of the committee who sustained the charges set forth in the said petition. Probably he sees that he made a mistake and that the best way out of it is to say nothing.

Now I claim that the council when they received the report of the committee which they appointed to investigate the charges and that committee reported that they found charges set forth in said petition sustained that the council had no more of a legal right according to the law and the rules and regulations and previous procedures at the council and also parliamentary proceedings to confirm Brown and Phillips in their seats at the council than they had to take any other two ratepayers of the Parish of Northampton and that the warden made a mistake in receiving the motion and it is his duty and he should give it his careful attention and have it carefully looked into and have the wrong rectified and have the law carried out without favour or partiality.

And as for Councillors Carvell and Bell if they have allowed themselves to be made use of by others or out of sympathy for others in leading the council to commit an illegal act, if they are honest and intelligent gentlemen and wish to do what is right, which I presume they are, they will grasp the first opportunity when the council meets and have the wrong made right.

If the council was called upon by the local government of this province (which it has a legal right to do) to show cause why they did not uphold and carry out the law in this election investigation what have they to show? Nothing. As five of them as a committee reported that they found four of the five charges sustained, which was sufficient to set aside the election.

In view of the prospects of there coming before the council at its next session important business such as bonding the county for money to build a Court House there should be left no chances for the legality of the proceedings by having two men sitting at the council who are not members.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
