TOWN COUNCIL.

The Town Fathers met in special session Monday evening, the full board being present. The principal business was consideration of the Contracts drawn up between the Town and The John McDougall Co for machinery, and that The Woodstock Electric Railway Light & Power Co for Power. Upon the former being read Coun Dunbar protested against that part of the specifications wherein cross belts are provided, claiming that direct gear is preferable. The matter of cost is not serious as the Councillor claims his way involves no more outlay than the other. Warden Bailey being present was asked his opinion as an expert machinist. He said he would not run even a grindstone with a half cross belt. It was decided to ask the Clerk to write the McDougall Co with reference to the proposed change.

Upon the reading of the contract with the Power Co, and after conferring with Messrs Hayden, Bailey, White, Fisher and Carvell, it was decided to pay the Company pro-rata for any service in lighting previous to the coming into force of the whole contract on April 10th next, that being the date upon which The McDougall Co agree to have the machinery installed. The Power Co people say they will be able to run the lights within 60 days.

The Mayor inquired as to whether any incandescent lamps were to be used in addition to the Arc Lights. It was decided to ask the Power Co directors what figure they would name for additional power. Mr Carvell was called upon, and before going into that question, made a review of the different clauses in the contract. Certain minor differences were satisfactorily adjusted. As to the incandescent lamp query, Mr Carvell said the Company had power for sale, and did not care what use the Town put it to. As to exact cost, he could not answer off hand, but seemed to think the expense of installing incandescents would be rather heavy, and therefore did not wish to put in the same. In the event of the Town deciding to use the incandescents, the Company would be willing to supply current at pro rata rates.

On motion of Coun Leighton seconded by Coun Fields, it was unanimously ordered that the Mayor and Town Clerk be authorized to execute both contracts. Before the question was put Mayor Munro stated he wished it understood that he was not opposed to the contract, as he considered it a very fair one to the Town. He thought a most valuable feature is the non-fluctuating price, which is a just one, compared with cost in other places, and the cost in the past for similar service.

GRIST FOR THE LAWYERS.

The circuit court met Tuesday, Judge Gregory presiding. There were six criminal cases, one of which, The King vs C R Shaw, was a postponement from the last circuit. The grand jurors chose Alex Henderson as foreman, and John A Lindsay for secretary. After listening to an able charge from the judge they retired, and deliberated upon the following:

The King vs J N Chute, assault. No Bill.
The King vs Carlisle, assault. True Bill.
The King vs Lovely, assault. No Bill.
The King vs Robt Shannon, assault. True Bill.

The King vs Ed Faulkner, shooting with intent to do grievous bodily harm. True bill on second count only.

The Grand Jurors made two presentations. Taking their cue from the judge's charge they condemned the stipendiary magistrates for sending frivolous matters to the Grand Jury, and also made the evergreen expression of regret that so far the County Fathers have not awakened to the fact that a new court house is needed. Mr Colpitts, a member of the jury, inquired of the Court what steps could be taken to help him close out the Line Store dens. The Judge said if they were maintained as disorderly resorts, an action could be brought against the proprietors on that charge.

The King vs Chas Rigby Shaw was first called, and took up the remainder of the day and most of Wednesday. The charge was that in the month of May last the defendant discharged a gun at Donald McKendrick with intent to do grievous bodily harm. A plea of not guilty was entered. Solicitor General Jones was on hand to prosecute on behalf of the Crown and Mr Hartley appeared as counsel for McKendrick. F B Carvell M P defended Shaw. McKendrick and his son testified for the Crown, and about half a dozen witnesses appear-

Judge Stevens Passes Away.

St Stephen, Oct. 16 — Judge Stevens, who has been ill for some time, died this morning.

His Honor James Grey Stevens was son of the late Andrew Stevens of Edinburg and a Grandson of Sir Colin Campbell of Argyle. He was born in Edinburg on February 25th, 1822, and completed his literary education at the university in that city. Coming to New Brunswick in 1840, he was called to the bar in 1847, and practiced his profession in Charlotte County. He sat for Charlotte in the Provincial Assembly, 1861-65 when he was defeated on the question of confederation, which he favored. He sat again from 1866 until his elevation to the bench July 19, 1867. In the latter year he was created a Q C. For eight years Judge Stevens was Secretary of the Board of Agriculture and for thirty years president of the St Croix Agricultural Society. He always took an interest in charitable objects and has been foremost in the promotion of education, holding for many years responsible positions on the board of school trustees. Judge Stevens was a staunch Presbyterian and was in 1895 a delegate to the Montreal Convention which brought about the union of the church in Canada. He was moderator of the St John Presbytery in 1897, and was a regular attendant at the sessions held here until a few years ago. Judge Stevens decided to retire from the county court bench some four years ago and was succeeded in the Charlotte, Carleton, Victoria, Madawaska circuits by John L Carleton of St John. Judge Stevens has prepared and edited a number of publications which have been of value to members of the legal profession. He married in 1845 Miss Elizabeth H Marks, daughter of John Marks. A large family survive, one of whom is Mrs J Rankin Brown of Woodstock.

Mr Carvell, while not denying the fact that the gun was discharged, proved to the satisfaction of the jury that it contained no shot or bullet, there could have been no malicious intent, and that the evidence of the crown's witnesses was defective. Able addresses by Hon Mr Jones and Mr Carvell preceded an impartial charge by the learned Judge. After short deliberation the jury found the defendant guilty of common assault only, and the Judge imposed a fine of \$100.

The Grafton shooting case was taken up next. In this Ed Faulkner was put on trial to answer for wounding one Al Geddes with a revolver. The Solicitor prosecuted, and Mr Carvell defended. Not much headway was made up to five o'clock in the afternoon when Court was adjourned by his honor until this (Friday) morning. There is considerable civil business, and the prospect is that court will not finally adjourn until Tuesday.
