## THE CONFERENCE.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 14.—The Pro-  
vincial conference closed successfully  
Saturday evening with an announce-  
ment by Sir Wilfrid Laurier that he  
was willing to ask the Imperial Par-  
liament to amend the British North  
America Act in such a way the pro-  
vincial subsidies would be increased  
on the basis of the present popula-  
tion to the extent of \$2,372,000 a year,  
and to provide for further increase  
in proportion to the growth in popu-  
lation.

The provincial premiers practi-  
cally got all they asked for with the  
exception of twenty cents a head for  
criminal administration, and with the  
exception of the exorbitant de-  
mands of British Columbia for spe-  
cial recognition.

In return the Dominion Govern-  
ment was given to understand that  
the provinces would give up control  
of deep water fisheries, and would  
abandon commercial travellers' tax.

## TERMS OF THE INCREASE.

On behalf of the Federal Govern-  
ment Sir Wilfrid announced he was  
prepared to grant the provinces in-  
creases on the basis of the resolutions  
of the Quebec conference of 1887 as  
far as specific allowance for legisla-  
tion and civil government is con-  
cerned; secondly, he was prepared  
to grant a capitation allowance of  
eighty cents a head on the popula-  
tion of the various provinces  
shown by the last decennial census  
of 1901. That eighty cents a head  
would be allowed each province on  
a population up to two and a half  
millions and for all population above  
that figure sixty cents a head. For  
the specific allowance for legislation  
and civil government, the Quebec  
resolutions provided that provinces  
with a population up to a hundred  
and fifty thousand the allowance is  
\$100,000; the minimum paid to any  
province; for population between  
one fifty and two hundred thousand,  
\$150,000 subsidy; two to four hun-  
dred thousand people, \$180,000, spe-  
cific subsidy; four to eight hundred  
thousand people, \$190,000; eight  
hundred thousand to a million and a  
half of people specific subsidy of  
\$220,000; above a million and a half  
of people a subsidy of \$240,000, which  
is the maximum.

British Columbia given a hundred  
thousand a year for ten years more  
than its proper proportion owing to  
greater expense of administration.  
New Brunswick, Manitoba, P. E. I.,  
Alberta and Saskatchewan have not  
yet increased in population to obtain  
the limit of their present capitation  
allowance.

**PREMIER MCBRIDE WITHDRAWS.**  
Next in interest and importance to  
the announcement that increased  
subsidies would be granted the event  
of the last day's proceedings was the  
withdrawal of Premier McBride of  
British Columbia from the confer-  
ence after he had been de-  
nounced as neither "candid nor  
frank" by Premier Whitney of  
Ontario.

Premier McBride had asked to  
have the claim of British Columbia  
left for valuation by a special  
arbitration. This had been voted  
down. He then intimated that he  
would accept a special increased al-  
lowance on a sliding scale beginning  
at a dollar a head now and running  
down to 25 cents a head when the  
population of his province reached  
two and a half millions. This the  
other eight premiers declared was  
far beyond what they would recom-  
mend, and Premier McBride was of-  
fered a hundred thousand a year  
extra. Premier McBride refused and  
Premier Whitney then denounced  
the position he had taken.

After Premier McBride had with-  
drawn, Premier Roblin went to the  
British Columbia room to induce  
him to return to the conference  
room. The visit was without result  
and the British Columbia premier  
ended his connection with the con-  
ference and its proceedings were  
concluded without him.

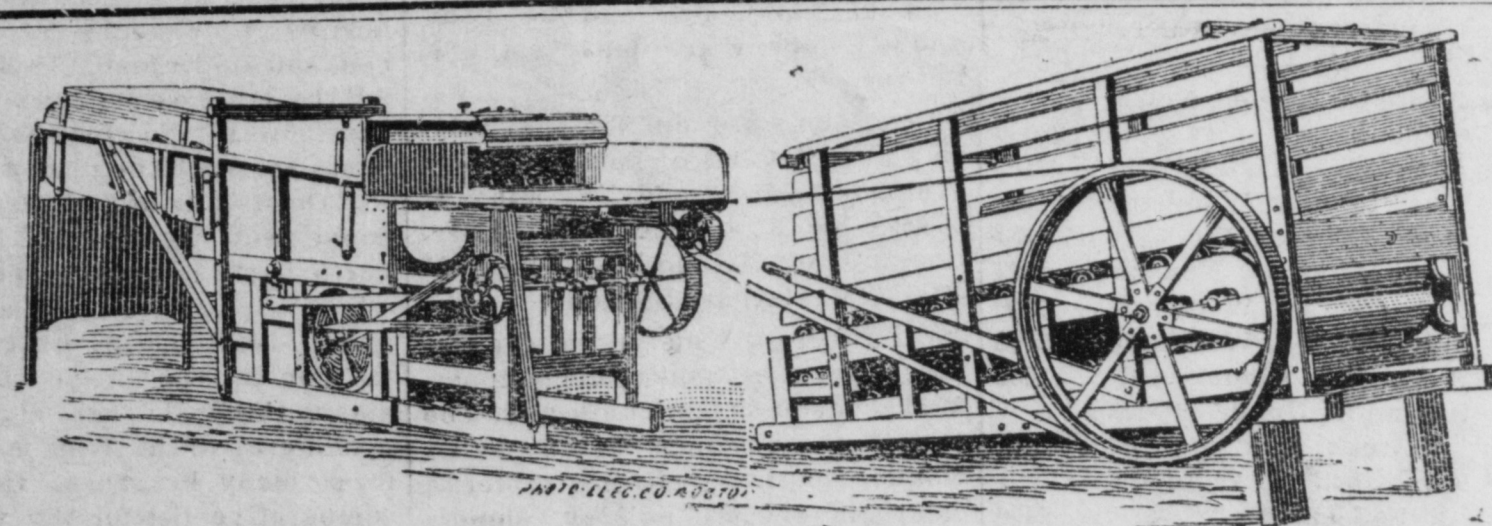
