To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:-SIR,-I for one have been much interested in the series of articles in your paper on the Court House. As

a firm believer in economy in all things, and one of those who seven or eight years ago fought strenuously to prevent the erection of a new court house in the Town, I may perhaps be permitted to say a few things

on the question without offence, and probably with some effect. In the first place I quite agree with

those who believe and contend that a modern building in the Town should now be erected, for the sake of the good name of our fair county, and the certain saving which will

result in the long run, if as I earnestly trust shall prove the case, a revenue be derived from the leasing of the vacant rooms in the Record Office and the proposed suites in the new Court House for the use of the legal fraternity. I would not be satisfied, however, to go ahead unless we have a guarantee of some

sort that the offices would be sure to receive tenants.

Since the erection of the jail on the County Lot in the Town I have been absolutely convinced that further opposition to the erection of a Court House in the Town is simply an act of nonsense. On the ground of economy it cannot be subject to any objection. I desire that the new court, housefor I take it for granted thatone must be built as the council is
