### FAT POLITICAL JOBS.

Governor Snowball's tenure of office may be terminated any time after next February. The probabilities are that he will be permitted to meet the legislature at the opening in the latter part of that month, and prorogue or possibly dissolve it a few weeks later. His successor will doubtless be chosen from the following list:—Senator King, Premier Tweedie, ex-Governor McClellan, Senator Ellis and Hon L. P. Farris. Of these the most likely is the senator from Chipman, who if he be willing to take the office, certainly stands the best show of getting it. The Premier is undoubtedly a good second in the race, and the ex-governor has a strong pull as well. Senator Ellis seems scarcely destined to grasp the prize, and the same may be said for Hon Mr Farris, who is doing nicely in his present field of activity. He is moreover booked for a bout with Mr R. D. Wilmot, the present M. P. for Sunbury-Queens, and the party managers will doubtless insist upon his acceptance of the federal nomination, since he is looked upon as about the only liberal who could wrest the tight little river constituency from the man from Belmont. Should Senator King assume the governorship, the vacant senatorship would be worth striving for, and in all probability Hon H. A. McKeown of St John would stand an excellent chance to secure it, unless the friends of Hon Mr Farris put up a decided kick in his favor.

Westmorland County now has living within its boundaries three senators, Hon Messrs Wood, Poirier, and McSweeney, and there are excellent prospects for two more citizens of the banner eastern county. Rumors emanating from reliable sources indicate the early calling of Dr Gaudet and Mr John T. Hawke to the Upper Chamber, making five in all for the county. This fact along with the coincidence that two Supreme court judges reside in the same county, seems proof positive that it is well to live in Westmorland. Look at Carleton County in contrast. We have never had a Superior court judge, and never a senator resident within our boundaries. Even our present excellent and popular county court judge is an importation. Is the county, so fertile agriculturally, sterile when it comes to producing great men? Surely not.

We are not in the secrets of the patronage department, and therefore refrain from speaking officially, nevertheless we will say that all signs point to the early announcement of the make-up of our reorganized Supreme Court. The appellate division, to be presided over by the new Chief Justice Barker, will consist of the chief and Judges Gregory and Hon A. S. White. Judges Landry, Hannington and McLeod will go on circuit duty.

### Several Vacant Seats.

There are eight vacant seats in the Commons. In Ontario North Bruce, East Elgin and North Renfrew are without representation. All three were carried by the conservatives with slender majorities a couple of years ago. In Quebec the appointment of Hon Mr Lemieux to the position as Postmaster General, a cabinet office, vacates both Nicolet and Gaspé. Quebec County lost its member through the elevation of Mr Fitzpatrick to the bench, and St Mary's, one of the Montreal divisions, is similarly situated through the appointment of Camille Piche as a local judge in Montreal. Down in Shelburne and Queens, N. S., Finance Minister Fielding lost his seat through corrupt acts on the part of an agent. This brings the total up to eight. The by-elections will soon be on, and the government should hold everything in Quebec and also retain the Nova Scotian vacancy. In Ontario the conservatives may win two seats, but it is quite possible that it will cost them dearly to do more than hold North Renfrew. In the other two the government is making a dead set, and will likely land its men. Fortunately this province is singularly free from by-elections. At best they are only nuisances, and except in the case of death or appointments to office, quite vexatious and unnecessary. Interviewed the other day in Toronto, Mr R. L. Borden did not seem any too sanguine with respect to opposition prospects. Read between the lines his remarks are decidedly discouraging to his followers.

### The Local Election.

Our King Street contemporary throws doubt upon the assertion that we shall have no local general election this year. In spite of the inside organ's tactics we repeat our prophecy, and shall proceed to give the Press a few facts upon which it may meditate or comment until it has its fill. In the first place we may as well state that Smith, Flemming and Hartley will be the conservative nominees. How could it be otherwise? Smith and Flemming are bound to try again, and where can they find a better running mate than Mr Hartley? He is undoubtedly the ablest conservative in the county. It's silk hats against doughnuts that he will be nominated, and what is more—head his ticket when the votes are counted. But for all that, we cannot see how or why Carleton County will go back on the liberal party. The Solicitor General and his two colleagues to be chosen, who must both be straight liberals, will have a comparatively easy victory if they work harmoniously and are early in the field. It's no use delaying the game. The candle may be burning at both ends. We have no idea who will run with the Solicitor, but in justice to themselves and the government, they should be placed in the field at no distant date. The government candidates will be up against a ticket practically working since the last election.
