

Juvenile Smokers.

A committee of the house of lords has recommended the adoption of a bill which provides that any child under 16 who is found in the possession of cigarettes or found smoking tobacco in any form shall be fined not more than forty shillings for each offence. Persons selling tobacco or cigarettes to juveniles will be similarly punished. The committee is of opinion that the following additious should be made to the repressive clause-apparently with the object of insuring their being carried out to the uttermost.


Police constables should be empowered to stop all youths apparently under sixteen seen smoking in any public place, and they should also be allowed to confiscate any tobacco

Local authorities should be allowed to extend some of these powers up telephone poles from Foreston to to park keepers, schoolmasters, and others be means of by-laws, while similar powers might also be given to railway and dock companies on

> their own premises. Some provision should exempt children who are genuinely employed by their fathers to fetch tobacco


