Letter from Dr Sprague.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—  
Having written a few lines to the  
Dispatch, I thought you might not be  
averse to printing a short letter from  
an old subscriber away on a brief  
vacation. We left Woodstock on the  
18th to join the N B Contingent going  
to the British Medical Association  
meeting at Toronto. The regular  
work of the meeting began on the 21st  
preparations for which had been  
going on for a long time, and ended  
on the 25th. I shall not attempt to  
give any kind of report of the meet-  
ings or entertainments at this time,  
suffice it to say that there were about  
2300 members of the profession en-  
rolled, the lady visitors bringing the  
total to about 3000. Many leading  
and illustrious men from the differ-  
ent countries were present and it  
was a privilege and inspiration to  
have the opportunity to hear some  
of them. There was social entertain-  
ment for all, provided with a gener-  
ous hospitality hard to equal in a city  
in the world. We had a full share of  
the enjoyment and were kept very  
busy during our weeks stay in  
Toronto.

Our pleasure of the preceding week  
was unexpectedly and rudely marred  
when on leaving for Montreal on the  
26th, we found through some bung-  
ling and neglect on the part of C P R  
officials we were compelled to buy  
full tickets for home and to go minus  
a sleeper which we had engaged 3  
days previously. To say that I was  
annoyed beyond measure is putting  
it mildly and it remains to be seen  
what reparation will be made to us  
who had complied with all the con-  
ditions of the journey.

In Montreal yesterday I had the  
pleasure of a game of Golf over the  
links of the Victoria Club, with my  
cousin Mr E H McLea. The course  
is 6 miles from the city or beyond  
the great Victoria Bridge and is  
over a very flat country. The  
course of 18 holes is about 6000 yards  
long but there is a great sameness  
about it, in spite of the fact that  
nearly \$100,000 has been expended in  
making bunkers hazards etc. I hope  
to have a game on other grounds be-  
fore starting for home. We saw the  
"SENTINEL" and "Dispatch" here  
yesterday and learned the news  
from home.

I hope Mr Editor to give you a  
fuller verbal sketch of our trip at a  
later date.

#### OUR CHICAGO LETTER.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—  
I have just finished reading a re-  
port of the recent meeting of the  
Maritime Board of Trade, and I note  
with much pleasure that at last the  
people of the maritime provinces are  
beginning to see and to appreciate

the goodly heritage that is theirs  
and are seeing too that they are not  
getting a square deal from the  
federal government in the matter of  
immigration. It has been the policy  
of the federal government backed up  
by the great railways to encourage  
immigration to the great west and  
to practically neglect the claims of  
the lower provinces in this regard,  
and while the people of the maritime  
provinces help to pay the cost of  
this colonization movement it does  
them no good, but rather harm as  
their young people are induced by  
the golden stories to leave their  
homes in the east and seek homes  
among strangers in the wilder west.  
Now that the board of trade has  
raised this question I sincerely hope  
they will not suffer it to die a  
premature death because of neglect  
or apathy on the part of the differ-  
ent members of the legislatures and  
parliaments of Canada and the pro-  
vinces. In this connection would  
say that right here is a good place  
for Messrs Jones and Carvell to gain  
the everlasting respect and good  
will of Carleton County by constantly  
urging from their respective places  
in the political arena the claims of  
Carleton County for a share of the  
immigration that the federal govern-  
ment is spending good money for.  
Everybody knows who is at all con-  
versant with the facts in the case  
that Carleton County is as well able  
to support an agricultural popula-  
tion of five times its present numbers  
as any county or part of Canada of  
the same size is, I don't care where  
such an area may be, and in addition  
to Carleton's ability to support a  
great many more farmers she has  
the advantage of the prairie coun-  
tries in the fact that she can provide  
work for the farmer in winter time  
in her lumber woods. While it is  
much more desirable that the  
farmer stay on his farm in the win-  
ter months as well as in the summer  
yet if he be short of ready cash as  
most beginners are he will find this  
chance to take his team in the woods  
in the winter months and earn ready  
cash with it is ahead of having to  
feed an idle team and himself as well  
with no visible source of supply as  
many of the farmers in the prairie  
districts have to do, and when the  
time arrives that the farmer in Car-  
leton county becomes so fixed  
financially that he does not have to  
go to the lumber woods he then can  
stay home and pay more attention  
to stock raising and dairying which  
pays better than in the woods but  
requires some little capital to get  
started in.

Outside of Carleton County in New  
Brunswick there is lots of room for  
many immigrants to develop the  
manufactures of St John, and the  
fisheries of the coast and rivers of  
the north. To my mind New Bruns-

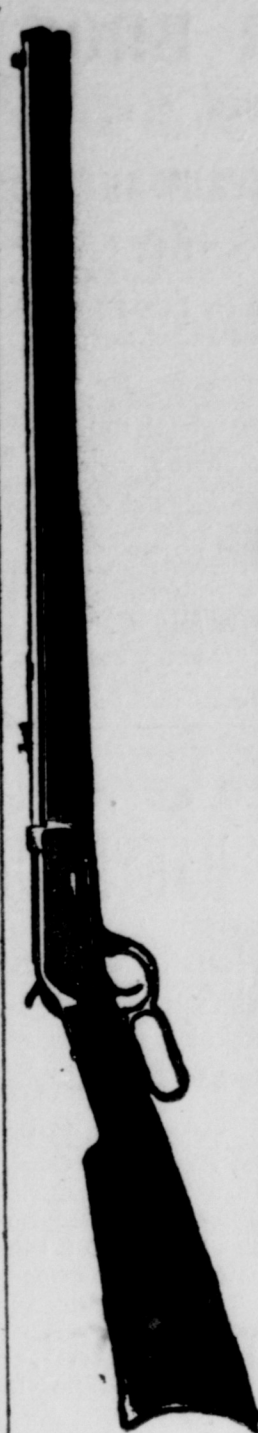
wick has been making to strong an  
appeal for the sportsman to visit her  
forests and has not pushed hard  
enough for the real settler of the  
land. While the sportsman is all  
right as a revenue producer for the  
time he spends in the country, yet  
for all that he is only a destroyer  
and the small revenue derived from  
his license would only be a drop in  
the bucket as compared to the taxes  
that the good settler would pay  
in a few years. I say let N B join  
with the other maritime provinces  
and push hard and persistently for  
the real settler of the land get more  
of the hardy scotchmen like those in  
Scotch Colony back of Kilburn (only  
for pity sake) give them a better  
section to start in on than those peo-  
ple had and help them for a few  
years as the federal government did  
the Doukoubors and see another  
second Glassville or better.

This would not only be a good  
thing for the settlers who might  
come but would be a good thing for  
the people who remain in the county  
and province as well, as there is no  
country that has the opportunities  
for the man with small means as a  
country that is fast filling up with  
settlers, while on the other hand if  
Carleton County does not soon get  
some new blood in her midst there  
will be nobody left except the older  
people and business will naturally  
go backward.

Now is the time for the Maritime  
Provinces to pull together for the  
common good and not bicker as the  
board of trade were disposed to do  
over the proposed route of the G.T.  
p. While the valley route with  
shortest possible haul to St John is  
the correct route yet the finest settle-  
ment of that route is not of so much  
importance to those provinces as the  
question of getting new blood into  
the country to take the place of the  
thousands who leave that country  
every year, that is the big question  
before the legislatures and the bal-  
ance of N B will not be benefited  
much by it until she gets more peo-  
ple on her lands to benefit. In other  
words N B has enough railroad  
mileage per capita at the present  
time, and if the present needs of the  
people of N B were the only con-  
sideration I doubt whether the G T P  
would even enter the province at all  
—I rather think not.

My final word on this subject is,  
don't forget your possibilities and  
let all the papers and all the legis-  
lators take the subject up with all  
due diligence and never let up till  
the province of N B has a population  
of two million people. In this event  
perhaps Carleton County could af-  
ford a new Court House, at least she  
could much better afford it than she  
can now with her sons and daughters  
leaving her so fast.
