

1,000 P. E. I. Dairymen Discouraged.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Feb. 28.—Last year P. E. I. Island produced 1,641,780 lbs of cheese, valued at \$177,000, and 481,700 lbs of butter at \$104,630, an increase respectively of \$17,000 and \$4,000 over 1904, but the total quantity of milk was three-quarters of a million pounds less, owing to the shortage of feed and the dropping out of a thousand patrons discouraged at the poor prices of the previous year. Had all kept on, the yield would have been ten million pounds greater.
