The Debate in the Assembly.

In another part of this issue we print the official report of the able speech on the budget made by the Hon W P Jones in reply to Mr J K Fleming, the financial critic and local opposition chief of staff. Mr Jones' effort, like that of Mr Fleming, was an able one, and quite in keeping with the high rank of his public addresses. Perhaps the most satisfactory part of his speech was the reference to the Hartland Bridge, which owing to the strong pressure brought to bear upon the government by the Solicitor General, will be free to all on and after the first day of May in the present year. The people of Hartland, Victoria Corner, Somerville, in fact of all the adjoining section, are loud in their praise of the able Solicitor General, who has done so much to please the constituency. The succeeding speakers were able, however, to put quite a different construction upon many of the things that to the opposition appeared indefensible. It is altogether likely that in a large degree Pope's famous couplet

"All seems infected that the infected spy
As all seems yellow to the jaundiced eye"

applies to the opposition in their effort to discredit the administration.

Every person is liable to a penalty of **Twenty Dollars**, who, upon any part of any Span of any bridge which exceeds forty feet in length rides or drives or permits to be driven any horse, horses or cart at a pace faster than a walk.

It shall be the duty of every constable, policeman or other peace officer to strictly enforce this act by prosecuting any person found violating the same. Supervisors of Great Roads, Highway Commissioners and Caretaker of any bridge are also constables ex-officio, for the purpose of this act.
