MORE FROM THE INDIAN TERRITORY.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—
I notice with some degree of satisfaction that you did not consign my last efforts to your waste basket, which emboldens me to try again.

To give you an illustration of our winter in this part of the south, I will refer you to my last where in I said it was a very warm day (about 50 in the shade) well that very night it turned cool and before morning it began to snow and drift and before noon the following day we had snow drift two feet deep, something the old timers tell me they never saw before in this extreme southern part of Indian Territory. In a few days the snow disappeared and we have had regular May weather ever since until last night (in the night) it began to rain, and kept it up till about noon to day when the wind shifted to the north and it is now freezing and sleeting, and is cold enough to satisfy an Eskimau.

I not with considerable pride the prosperity your farmers are enjoying and hope the present good prices for farm produce will continue, and if they do you can depend upon it that the price of real estate will follow, and if your humble scribe was the fortunate owner of a good farm in your truly prosperous country, he would not be in any hurry to get rid of it.

You scribe has visited every province in the Dominion except P. E. Island and has been in fifteen states and territories of the U. S., but in all my going about I have not run across any country that shows more prosperity among the farmers as evinced by their nice houses and buildings, with their stock etc than you can find in your own good country. Of course I am speaking of purely natural countries, by that I mean countries where there are no large cities. I have seen in Ontario and in New York, Illinois, Missouri close in to their large cities a few farm houses and buildings that will possibly eclipse anything seen in your countries, but perhaps within 50 miles of these favored spots we would be in localities that would not begin to compare with the newest localities of your country.

When I lived in your country we all thought of Ontario as the garden of Canada, and in many respects it is, yet any one among you who have made the trip to Toronto via O.P.R. all the way can tell that after you leave the Ottawa river at Perth Junction till you get within 30 miles of the city that it is a very hard looking farm country as compared to your own favored spot in N.B. Of course if you take the Grand Trunk from Montreal to Toronto you do pass through a lovely country, with a good many fair sized cities to support a rich farming country. I will repeat that taking a country depending almost entirely on a foreign market for its produce N.B. will stand well up in the front rank as a farming country, and in my estimation she is a good country to stick to, especially to any one who may own a portion of her fertile soil, and if

the present good prices continue to prevail you will all see a general advance in the price of the lands same as many of you have no doubt watched over in Aroostook county Me.

Notice a good many of your best business men are thinking of going to the Canadian Northwest, this is to be deplored as the country can ill spare them, I have an idea that they will some of them at least be disappointed, for while that is a wonderful country and is receiving its full share of publicity yet it is not an Eldorado by any means and there are conditions there that the average New Brunswicker has not thought of that will tend to make one feel that after all there is no place like home. Your scribe he has seen that country and has been up against the very thing that he is trying to tell you about.

I contend if your Provincial Government would take a leaf out of Manitoba's book and spend a good sum of money judiciously to advertise the rich possibilities of your province in the old countries and would change the homestead laws and their forestry laws so as to guarantee more to the farmer and less to the lumberman that you could get your share of the immigrants who land at your front door every month of the winter. Surely the wonderful water power, your fertile lands your rich fisheries, and lumber industries could well afford to be more widely advertised.

Speaking about advertisement, your people should practise the art of local advertisement, if you want an example of what I mean go over to Aroostook county and hear the farmers there blow about how many potatoes they can raise to the acre and of what a wonderful country they have got—that kind of talk pays and they know it and that is one reason why they can get about four times as much for a hundred acres of their land than can the farmer of Carleton County for the same grade of land. And the Carleton County farmer has the advantage of living in a freer and better governed and a better class of citizens, than does the U. S. man. In other words your Carleton Co. man should cultivate the love of county to a greater extent than has been done by the average citizens, and never be afraid to be heard from when it comes to a comparison of his good country with some other, that may or may not be a better one.
