TOWN COUNCIL.

(By Our Special Reporter.)

The town fathers met in the council chamber, Monday evening. All the councillors were present. On motion Coun Leighton, seconded by Coun McManus, Coun Henderson took the chair and called the council to order. The minutes were read and approved and the council proceeded to business.

The town treasurer's report for the month was read and showed that the expenditures amounted to \$967.50 and the receipts were \$347.35. On motion this was referred to the finance committee.

Coun Fields from the water committee reported on the matter of W. L. Carr's bill for wood delivered at the pumping station and recommended that it be paid at the rate of \$2.60 per cord instead of \$3. On motion the bill for 134 cords amounting to \$352.95 was ordered paid as recommended.

Coun Fisher reported that the water, fire and electric light committees had agreed on the matter of dividing the engineer's salary between those committees as follows: that the water department pay \$76, the fire department \$5 and the electric light department pay \$40. On motion the report was adopted.

Moved by Coun Leighton, seconded by Coun Fields, that H. W. Bourne be paid \$8 to pay balance of premium on his guarantee bond. Carried.

Coun Fields moved that the town treasurer be authorized to pay bills upon an order from the chairman of any committee where such bills are an immediate necessity. This motion being seconded by Coun Fisher was carried.

A communication from the school trustees with a petition from the school teachers asking for an increase of salaries for female teachers was read. Coun Leighton moved that the town clerk be instructed to reply to the school trustees and say that the town has no way of adding to the warrant already issued, and that the trustees can increase the salaries if they wish and next year ask for sufficient appropriation to recoup the amount so expended. This motion being seconded by Coun Fields was carried.

Moved by Coun Leighton, seconded by Coun Fields, the mayor and Couns Henderson and McManus were appointed a standing committee, called the law committee. Carried.

Coun Fields moved that the Scott Act Inspector's salary be one hundred dollars. This seemed to be a delicate motion and none of the councillors seconded it.

On motion the council adjourned until Friday evening.

PERSONALS.

Mrs. W. A. Payson, accompanied by her brother, Mr. Killikelly, arrived in town Tuesday.

Rev. I. N. Thorne, of Whitbyville, North Co., a delegate to the Orange Grand Lodge, was the guest of his son this week.

Among the many outsiders in town this week was the future pastor of the Methodist Church, Rev. H. J. Fulton of Hampton. While here he met many of his former parishioners.

There is some smallpox at McAdam but the authorities are wide awake, and so far there is little alarm.

Agricultural Society.

A largely attended meeting of the Society was held Saturday afternoon with Pres C. L. S. Raymond in the chair. Official announcement of a grant of \$1800 towards the proposed exhibition was read. The draft of a lease between the Society and H. E. Gallagher for the use of the trotting park by the latter was read, and it was ordered that same be executed by the proper officials. The report of the Seed Committee was received. They had secured about \$800 worth of seeds from Ewing & Co. Tilley & Dow were appointed distributors for this year. On motion the seed was ordered sold at invoice price plus local charges. H. Emery was appointed distributor for Jacksontonville. A strong committee was appointed to revise the prize list, and another committee of three named to look up a suitable person to act as secretary of the Exhibition and submit their recommendation at the next meeting. On motion of N. F. Phillips the Society decided to hold a live stock sale sometime early in 1907. The public would do well to keep in mind the dates for the Exhibition. It will open on Tuesday, Sept. 25th and close on Friday, 28th Sept. The next meeting of the Society, which is expected to be a very important one, will be held on Saturday afternoon, 14th inst. All members, and those who desire to become such, are invited.

Charles VanWart.

The public received a sad shock early Sunday morning when it was learned that Charles VanWart, one of our oldest and most respected citizens, had suddenly expired during the night. Heart failure carried him off. He had been about as usual on Saturday until nearly nine o'clock in the evening, when he complained of illness. In a few minutes he sank into unconsciousness, and the end came swiftly afterwards. The deceased was born 76 years ago in the parish of Hampstead, Queens Co., from the sturdy stock so well-known in that county. Early in life he came to this part of the province and settled at Waterville, but after a few years moved into town, where he conducted up to the time of his death a meat and grocery business. He is survived by his widow, one unmarried daughter, Miss Drucilla, and Mrs. Geo. A. White, wife of the local manager of the Bank of Montreal. Mrs. Grass of Waterville is a sister. There are also two brothers and two sisters living at Hampstead and St. John. Mr. VanWart was an upright and respected member of the Free Baptist denomination, and for many years filled the place as deacon of the Woodstock church. The funeral services, largely attended, were held Tuesday afternoon. Rev. F. Allison Currier M. A. was in charge.
