GRAND ORANGE LODGE.

McLeod in the chair, and over one hundred delegates present from all parts of the province. County Master Charlie M. Shaw read the following address of welcome:—

Address of Welcome to the Officers and Members of The Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick.

RIGHT WORTHY SIR AND BROTHERS:—

Heartily, may I proudly do I bid you welcome amongst us in this Grand Orange County of Carleton.

Meeting as we do under such favorable auspices in this our sixty-third annual session, permit me to express the hope that at its close we may separate bearing with us the most pleasant feelings in reference to the manner and character of the work performed. The Grand Master was re-elected without opposition. Spirited contests resulted over the offices of Senior Deputy and Grand Chaplain.

P. G. M. David Hipwell installed the new officers. Newcastle was chosen as the next place of meeting. The remainder of the session was devoted to addresses. A great many prominent brethren spoke. One of the distinguished visitors to the meeting was the Rev. D. MacLean, Grand Master of P. E. I., who is an exceptionally clever speaker. As an orator he has few peers.

From the Grand Master's report we learn that during the year two new lodges were instituted, three resuscitated, ten incorporated by act of the Legislature, and four large new halls dedicated. He also spoke of his visit to the Supreme Lodge at Owen Sound, Ont.

The brethren seemed to be delighted with Woodstock, and it will be no surprise if at an early date they return here once more for the purpose of meeting in annual session of the Grand Lodge.
