THE BIG BANK.

In another part of this issue we have pleasure in presenting the annual financial statement of the Bank of Montreal, as submitted to the Directors at the recent meeting. The story is a very satisfactory one, as it conclusively proves the institution to be in better position than ever. The enormous capital of \$14,400,000, is backed up by an almost equally large reserve, amounting to \$11,000,000,—a million having been added during the year. It pays a ten per cent dividend, and the stock is climbing higher each year. It may be interesting to the general public to learn that the paper currency of this Bank in circulation amounts to over twelve million dollars, and the Deposits to almost a hundred and thirty millions! These stupendous figures convey but a slight idea of the magnitude of the business carried on by Canada's greatest Bank. E. S. Clouston is General Manager, and Lord Strathcona is chairman of the Board of Directors. The local agency is in King Street, under the careful and courteous management of Mr. George A. White, assisted by Mr. J. S. Creighton, accountant, and a staff of clever young men. Prosperous branches in this section are in operation in Hartland, Andover, Grand Falls and Edmundston.

Madawaska Court House

On Tuesday last Judge Carleton opened the new Court House at Edmundston. It is a handsome building and in every sense a credit to the County. On the first floor are the County offices, the law offices of Messrs. Stevens & Lawson and the Sheriff's office and residence. On the second floor is the court room, Judge's room, barristers' room, and the grand and petit jury rooms. All these rooms have marble wash basins, while the judge's and barristers' rooms have urinals. On the top floor is the town council room, the Mayor and clerk's room and a large room rented to the I. O. F. The first floor is heated with hot water, and steam is used for the rest of the building. In the L is the gaol. The cells of the gaol are of the cage kind of the latest pattern made of chilled steel and were imported from the U. S. The total cost of the building is nearly \$16,000. No expense was spared to make it comfortable and in every sense a model of what a temple of justice ought to be in this age and country. The learned Judge in his address said:—

"I wish to compliment the County of Madawaska on this court house which is much indeed to its credit having as it has, every necessary accommodation and modern convenience besides being an ornament to the town of Edmundston.

Public buildings are the index of the public spirit, progressiveness and culture of a people. A court house such as this County now possesses is not only a matter of local pride, but the strongest evidence of your attachment to the institutions of the country, your respect for the administration of justice and your loyalty to the Sovereign who through his justices, presides over the deliberations of our Courts of law.

I do not like, and I never did like lip loyalty, I like the loyalty which proves itself by actions. Such you have done in the present instance. The municipality deserves not only the thanks and congratulations of the bench and bar, but of the general public as well."

What has Carleton County to say for itself now?

The Organ Recital given Wednesday evening in St. Luke's by D. Arnold Fox was largely attended. Mr. Fox is certainly a master. Mrs. Hare and Mrs. Adney sang very acceptably.

Two Great Victories.

Still the good work goes on! The by-elections held on Wednesday in two of the Montreal Divisions resulted in splendid liberal victories. St. Mary's, vacated by Camille Piche's resignation, was contested by Alderman Mederic Martin, liberal, and Joseph Ainey, laborite, who had the backing of the conservatives, as well as that of Bourassa. The result here was a thousand majority for Martin. Bourassa, the labor organization and the conservative party, who were all allied against the government, thus received a severe set back.

In St. Ann's, won by Daniel Gallery in 1904, and vacated by that gentleman's unseating and disqualification, the fight was very hot, but J. C. Walsh won out over Frank Curran by about 200. In this division Mr. Ames made the fight his own, and the result is a great blow to the prestige of the man who thinks himself destined to crawl into Mr. Borden's shoes.

Money in Elections.

William Randolph Hearst, defeated candidate for Governor of New York State, has submitted a sworn statement of his election expenses, as by law directed, in which he claims an outlay of slightly over \$250,000. On the other hand, Charles E. Hughes, who won the fight, spent but a trifle over \$600. In Massachusetts, Governor Guild who was re-elected, laid out about \$50,000. John B. Moran, who gave him such a hard contest, says it cost him \$500. The salary of Governor of New York is \$10,000 and the term is only two years. Massachusetts elects her governor yearly, and pays him less than half that sum. How some rich men do love a little honor!

THE FARMERS' VOICE.

(From The Montreal Witness.)

One of the strongest memorials ever prepared by the representatives of the farmers of this country is printed in the Witness today. It is written over the signatures of Messrs J. C. Leithbridge, Master Dominion Grange, James McEwing, President Ontario Farmers' Association, and R. McKenzie, Secretary-Treasurer of the latter associations. The memorial expresses the views of the members of these associations upon the tariff, and declares that the farmers of Canada have become genuinely alarmed by the aggressive campaign carried on by the Manufacturers' Association during the past few years—an association that is never satisfied, but is always seeking to increase the monopolistic privileges of its members, always wanting more like a greedy child. The farmers tell Mr. Fielding and Parliament, what they should know and act upon without any need to tell them, that, while a protective tariff can and does limit the farmer's purchasing power, it cannot and does not enhance the price of the articles they have to sell, Mr. Ballantyne to the contrary notwithstanding. They might have gone much further and told Parliament that their product is greatly depreciated in value by the unwillingness of the country to take return cargoes in payment, thus increasing the freight cost. We quote the splendid conclusion of this memorial because it is a complete answer to those who taunt the farmer with being protected and yet criticising adversely the protection of others. The memorialists declare:—"We therefore ask, in the coming revision of the tariff, that the protective principle be wholly eliminated; that the principle of tariff for revenue only, and that revenue based on an honest and economical expenditure of the public funds, be adopted; and as proof of our sincerity, we will, if this position is adopted by the Government, gladly assent to the entire abolition of the whole list of duties on agricultural imports."

That is the right way to speak. No farmer who can think at all will want to have his birthright of liberty sold for such small sops as are thrown to him. It is time that the farmers should begin to make their voices heard.

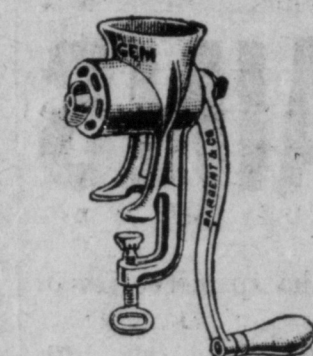
