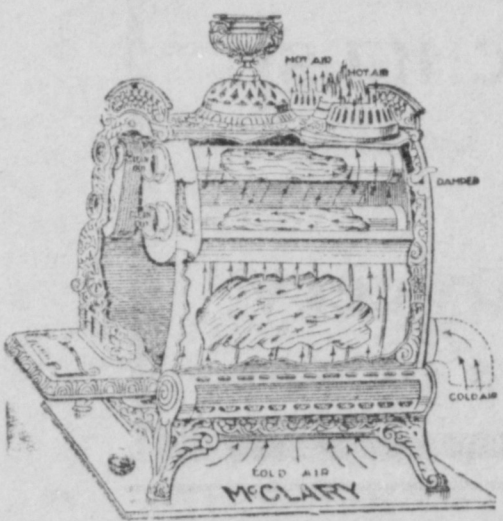

## POLITICAL POINTERS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is 65 years old. May he live far beyond the ordinary span of life is our fervent wish.

The King Street sheet says the Town Clock is getting black in the face. In this respect it almost rivals the Press itself.

The Press seems to have a wholesome horror of "the bosses," judging from the frequent allusions to these gentlemen. A burnt child dreads the fire.

Will Mr Foster be handed a lemon by his leader? It is almost a certainty that a very respectable element in the party would like to see the ex-Finance Minister get a full package of the citrus fruit.

The "Organizer" is about due in these parts. Surely the party in Carleton must have some return for that \$100 per annum, and the genial smile of the brilliant chief of staff is pretty nearly worth the money.

It is about up to the King Street organ to fire a broadside into the ranks of the "Carvell Ring," that body of workers whom it loves so well. The boys have had a rest from the muckrake for several moons.

The King Street journal of the hearth and home warns us against the danger of editing a paper with the shears. The habit is a bad one, and there are occasional pitfalls, as some of the best newspaper men in America can testify, but for all that we know of a sheet that would be considerably improved were it to adopt the scissors in place of the quill.

The Fredericton Herald thinks the Sentinel has a hungry Editor. When we manage to take on another hundred or so of fatty tissue and thus get over our lean, Cassius appearance, we may reach the happy, contented frame of mind so characteristic of the big hearted, big bodied, and handsome Herald editor. Until this happens we suppose we shall remain wolfish.

If the Press will go back over its own issues during the years 1903 4, or peruse its SENTINEL file of that period, it will easily discover what was wrong with the Town Council in those days. As for Ex-Coun Dibblee, who the Press says is to be the recipient of eulogies from this quarter, we have only to state that he may need a soothing balm after the anathemas the Press will doubtless hurl against his portly form.

The Press says it has been proven that Hyman's election was won by ballot stuffing, stealing ballot boxes, and switching votes. This is not so. At the very most the only crime proven is bribery, and that mainly on the evidence of a dis-appointed office seeker. This variety of informants, a few of whom we have near at home, will do anything in revenge. A turnaround is a bitter pill to swallow, as some parties close to the Press could testify.

Hon Frank J Sweeney, Surveyor General, passed through Woodstock the first of the week on his way to Madawaska County. It is said in some quarters that he has an eye to the federal nomination whenever Hon Mr Costigan retires from active political affairs, but it may be that there is no truth in the rumor, as the Surveyor is strongly attached to local affairs and his present constituency. Of course his knowledge of French and English would help him in a bi-lingual riding such as Victoria.

The conservatives in Ontario wish Hon Charles Hyman's resignation mainly in order to give Hon Adam Beck, local member for the seat, a chance to commit harikari, as he is an enthusiast on the cheap power question, and in that role is becoming a source of worry to the party. If Mr Hyman were to resign, Beck would be nominated to oppose him,—and wiped off the map politically. Who's afraid of Beck? Only his friends, and they are ready to knife him. Even with a united conservative support Adam Beck or any other man could not down Hyman in London.

Parliament opened yesterday. We understand the speech in reply to the address from the throne was made by Mr Fred F Pardee, the young member who held West Lambton in the by-election some months ago. He is a clever speaker and greatly distinguished himself as a member of the Arctic Investigating Committee last session, in the legal aspect of which case he was closely associated with Mr Carvell

and Mr McLean of Lunenburg. Joseph Demers, the new member for St John, P. Q., was the seconder. He was recently elected by acclamation to succeed his brother, the present Judge Demers.

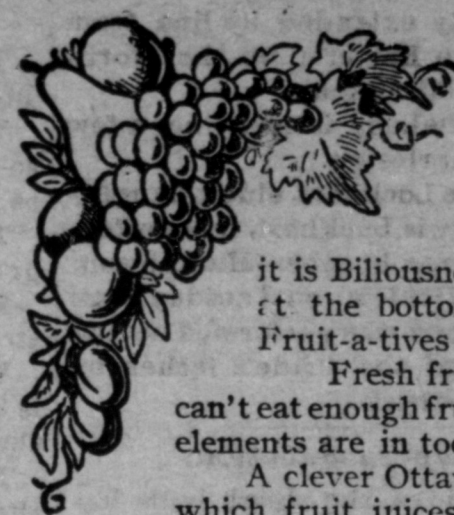
Last issue we said the rumor that the G T P is really to come down the valley was not confirmed. We might have added that another rumor,—that the Central Route is to be chosen,—was in the same box. The Press, taking advantage of a slightly humorous opportunity, commented after this fashion:—

"The SENTINEL says we are about as apt to get the G T P down the St John Valley, as that district is to export bananas."

Of course we said nothing of the kind. This is merely an example of the shameless lengths to which the indecencies of captious and criminally biased comment will carry what should be a self-respecting journal.

It is becoming more and more apparent that the Opposition will in the coming provincial campaign depend almost wholly upon the Highway Act as a source of weakness to the Administration. They will doubtless go so far as to promise to wipe it from the statutes entirely, and revert to the old law, in their frantic effort to get on the winning side. It may be that they have forgotten the manner in which they vied with the supporters of the Act in the Assembly in condemning the old fashioned statute labor. There may be some cases in which an amendment to the Act would be an improvement, but in our opinion the law is a good one, and if there be any dissatisfaction it is due rather to the men who enforce it than to any defect in the law itself. If it can reasonably be shown that the municipal councillors would be able to secure better superintendents we think it would be no harm to give them a chance. The great objection may thus be removed.

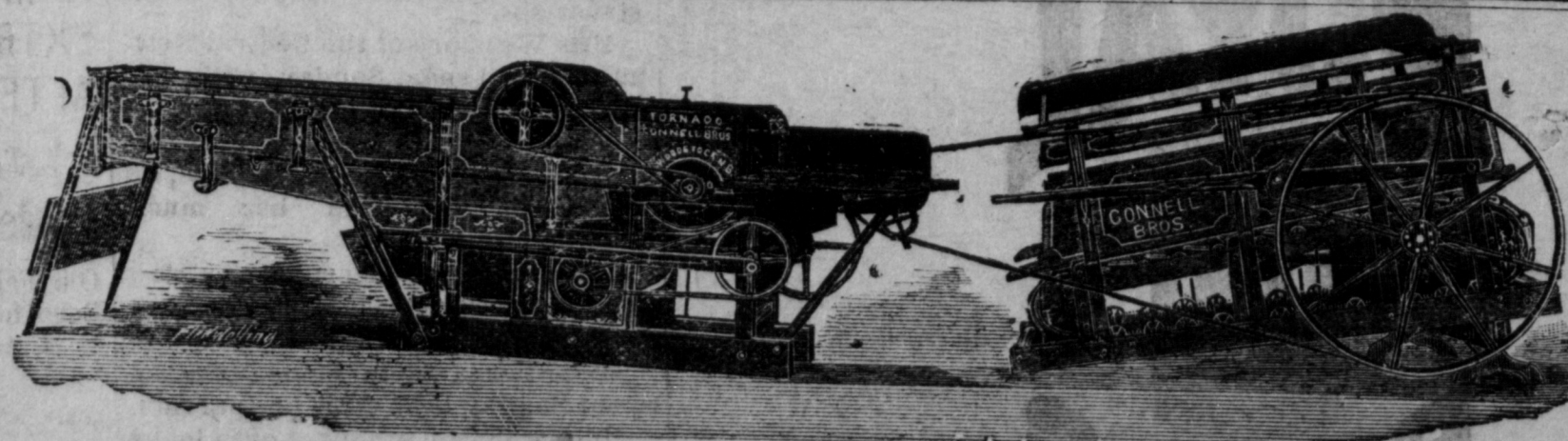
