Chairman. Mr Carvell, on coming forward to respond, was given a most flattering reception. He said it gave him extreme pleasure to see such a representative gathering of his friends and supporters. At the present when there is no election excitement honor, as your efforts on behalf of it seemed quite extraordinary for nearly two hundred workers from all over the county to assemble. Plunging at once into his course in parliament, Mr Carveil said in his first year he had been somewhat diffident, as the House almost invariably views with displeasure any evidence of haste on the part of new members. Last year, however, he did speak more frequently, and in the committee work took a larger part, having acted as counsel for the Government in one or two investigations. When he first took his seat he was a little surprised at the extent to which party feeling is carried. Even over the Pure Seed Bill, a section of the Ontario Opposition fought strenuously against the measure, largely because, although a good act, it was introduced by the Minister of Agriculture. connection he said the utmost credit is due Premier Tweedie and Attorney General Pugsley, who more zeal ously than the representatives of the other provinces, pressed for the increased subsidy. It almost seem ed as if the honor were nearly wholly theirs. As to the public works within the county he felt pleased with the Armoury. Carleton County has more militia in proportion to population than any other rural constituency in the Dominion, and therefore deserved the Armoury. Speaking on the Railway question Mr Carvell said he had worked and is yet working as diligently as he could. While a few of the employes in the past seemed to have a prejudice against the Valley, Mr Carvell is satisfied that justice will yet be done. It is true that early in 1905 Engineer Lumsden and the Commission reported in favor of the Back Route, in which document the central route is laid down as of less mileage, and of equal freight capacity. The delegates who went from York and Carleton in July last year got the ear of the Premier. Within a few days after that memorable interview all previous reports were counteracted by the Government, and new surveys ordered, and as there was some question as to the prejudice of the old surveyors, the member for Carleton was given a say in the appointment of the officials to make the New Surveys. Finally he secured the appointment of two absolutely reliable men, Engineers Balloch and Balcom, to make up the results from these latest surveys. While as yet they had not officially given out the statistics, he felt he was divulging no confidence in saying their report will prove conclusively that a road may be constructed down the Valley at a saving of at least \$1,500,000. distance is slightly greater against us than we had previously supposed. miles seems to be the result,-yet the enormously superior gradients and the immense saving in the cost of construction gives the Valley a deabsolute justice; he will favor the mind that the road is not a mere local enterprise. It is a great Nation al Highway, and the only thing that can be done is adopt the best route.
