The many friends of Mr. Wm. G. Johnson, of Halifax, formerly a popular clerk here in the Royal, will regret to learn that he is quite ill at his home, and his malady is considered a rather grave one.

Many friends in this county will sympathize with Senator Thompson of Fredericton in the death of his wife, which took place very suddenly on Friday night. The deceased lady was a sister of our present Lieutenant Governor.

The marriage is announced to take place at Grafton at the residence of the bride's parents on Tuesday next, December 11th, of Miss Mabel Jennie Estey, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chesley Estey, to Malcolm Alexander Orford, of London England.

Henry Harvey Stuart, principal of of Harcourt School has resigned, to assume the editorial direction of the Newcastle Advocate. Mr. Stuart is a self-made man,—has been a good teacher, and should ripen into a splendid editor. For some years he has been a regular contributor to several provincial papers.

The gross postal revenue of the Woodstock Office during the past fiscal year was \$7,638.81. 1142 money orders were issued amounting to \$24,125.99, and 2238 orders paid, for which the holders received \$38,627.24. Postal notes to the amount of \$4,997.41 were cashed. The salary and allowances came to \$2719.16.

Woodstock is to have a new meat market in the store formerly occupied as a hardware shop by A. E. Jones. W. H. Scovil is manager. The shop will be known as "The People's Cash Market." Mr. Scovil formerly worked here in another meat market, and is well known to the public. He should do well.

At the regular meeting of the Ladies' Auxiliary A. O. H. held in their rooms on Tuesday evening the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. T. I. McCafferty; Vice-President, Miss Carrie Caldwell; Recording Secretary, Miss Annie Riordan; Financial Secretary, Miss Minnie E. Hall; Treasurer, Mrs. Frank Kelly; Mistress-at-arms, Miss Sadie J. Brown; Sentinel, Miss Tressa Hughes.

Samples of chalcocopyrites from the Cobble-Sexton mine at Northampton were recently forwarded to Dr. Haanel, dominion assayer. On Saturday a report was received showing values from \$10.40 per ton, upwards. This is quite encouraging, and there is some talk of a syndicate being formed to buy out McClement and Greer, who hold a three fourths interest. It is understood they will part with their holdings for \$75,000.

The first social meeting of the Young Ladies Sewing Circle of St. Paul's was held at the residence of Mrs. Chas. McLean, Monday evening Dec 3rd. A very pleasant time was spent by all, and quite a sum was contributed by the young men in aid of the Circle.

John McCormac J. P. met with what might have proved a very serious accident Monday night. He fell down a flight of stairs at his home, and was picked up in an unconscious condition. No bones were broken, but the Squire received a severe shaking up. His escape from greater misfortune was indeed miraculous.

Hyman Jacobson, a St. John junk dealer, was arrested last Friday in that City and brought to Woodstock by Officer Kelly on the charge of buying stolen brass from the C. P. R. Next day he was given a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Dibblee, and sent up for trial at the term of the County Court which opens on Tuesday.

The Rev. Wm. DeWare of Waterville, a well known Baptist clergyman, died at his home on Wednesday, Nov 28th, in the 53rd year of his age. Mr. DeWare had been ill for about six years. He was a preacher of great power and eloquence. The funeral was held on Thursday, the sermon being preached by Rev. J. N. Barnes, who more than forty years ago baptized him. A widow, two daughters and a son mourn their loss.

The latest crank proposal in Parliament is Mr. W. F. McLean's contention that the Government should own all water power. Sir Wilfrid Laurier favored the ownership of water powers by municipalities. Now let some other crank move for Government or municipal ownership of all henroosts.
