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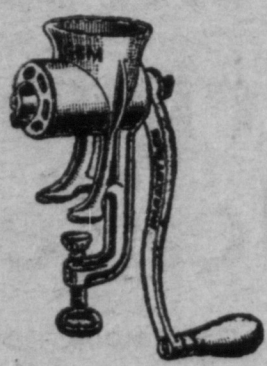

Toronto, Dec. 4.—A Jewish rabbi was driving past the house of a farmer named Barnes, near Buckingham, Saskatchewan, when a dog ran out and snapped at him. He lashed the dog with his whip, and Barnes told him to stop. Words passed then and the dog was struck again. The farmer became infuriated, and jumping on a horse started after the man. He fled, but was overtaken and caught by a rope. Barnes using the rope like an expert, lassoed the man while he was driving furiously to escape. He was caught around the head, jerked from his buggy and thrown to the ground, his neck being broken, and death followed in a few minutes. Barnes was arrested and sent to the Regina jail.

Valdosta, Ga, Dec 4.—With a declaration that he had told the truth and that his sons had no connection with the crime, Rev J G Rawlings, a former Baptist Minister, today ascended the scaffold and paid the penalty for the murder of Willie and Carrie Carter, in July, 1905. A J Moore, a negro, whose confession connected Rawlings with the crime, was hanged at the same time. Both men stepped upon the scaffold without a tremor. They stood on the trap together and fell together.

The expectation that Moore would make a final confession, exonerating Milton, Jesse and Leonard Rawlings, from participation in the murder, was not fulfilled. He reiterated his previous declaration that Milton fired the fatal shot.

The Georgia Prison Commission will meet on Thursday to consider the petition for commutation of sentence for Milton and Jesse. Leonard has been sentenced to life imprisonment on the recommendation of clemency by the trial Jury.
