

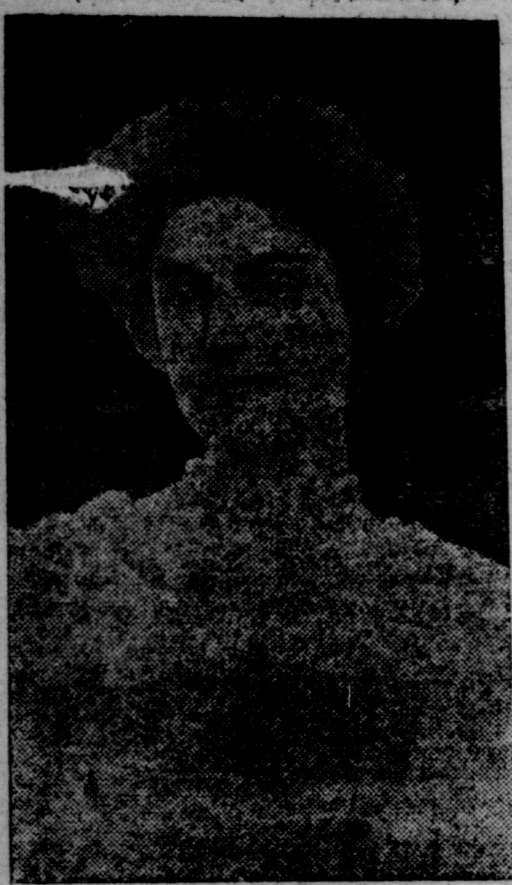

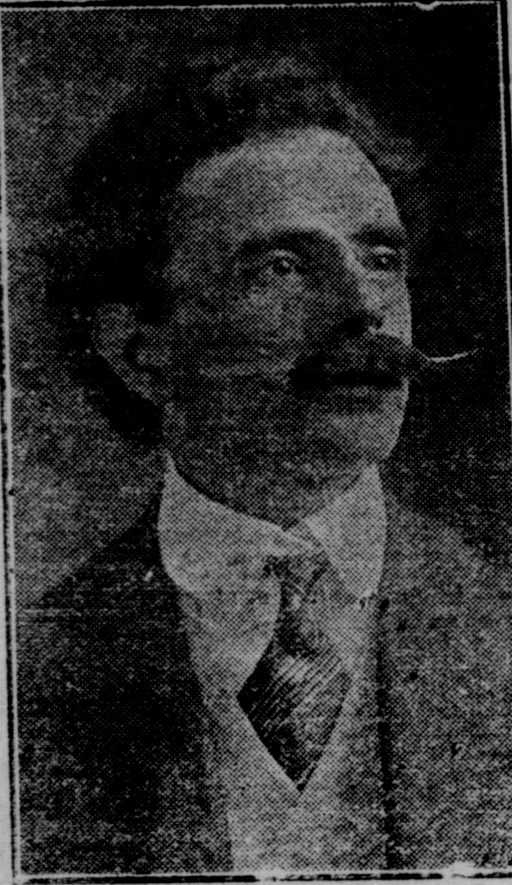

Woodstock's Great Event.

THE APPEARANCE OF ALBANI AND HER FINE COMPANY HERE MARCH 7.

Will be a Red Letter Day in the History of Woodstock.

### A LETTER FROM C. W. CONNELL.

To the Editor of Carleton Sentinel:—  
Allow me through your paper to explain to the ratepayers of this county the way in which the County Council disposed of a petition which I presented against the councillors of the parish of Northampton who claim to be elected at an election held on the 10th day of October last.

1 That the parish clerk, acting as chairman of the said election, neglected to take oath of office as the law requires after it was brought to his attention.  
2 That the voters list furnished the chairman was not a lawful one.  
3 The chairman left his place and was gone some time.  
4 The chairman permitted people to vote when their names were not on his list.

5 At the close of the poll the chairman neglected to administer the oath to tellers.  
On the petition being read to the council they referred it to a committee of eight councillors for investigation. The said committee, after an investigation, reported to the council that they found the charges, as set forth in the petition, all sustained throughout with the exception of section 3 and recommend the petition to the consideration of the council.

The council then talked the matter over pro and con as to the number of votes each candidate received and listened to considerable hearsay talk from one particular councillor as to previous elections which had nothing to do with the question before them, and then passed a resolution confirming the councillors in their seat. Had the council called upon Mr Hartley, their legal adviser which they should have done, probably they would have had a much better understanding of the law and the question they were called upon to decide.

It was not the number of votes each candidate received, nor was it sympathy for Councillors Brown and Phillips because they neglected to discharge their duty as councillors, nor was it hearsay talk that the council was called upon to decide, but it was the enforcement of the law passed by the legislature of this Province governing the election of county councillors which gives the council their existence and jurisdiction which says that the chairman shall take oath of form A, that the assessors shall furnish the parish clerk with a lawful list and the chairman shall not permit any person to vote when their names are not on the list and that the tellers shall take oath. If these charges were proven at a court of justice as they were before the committee who sustained them any one of them would be sufficient to set aside the election.

The council in confirming the councillors in their seats has established a precedent that in future elections it makes no difference whether the law has been complied with or not, they will not carry out the law but will recognize the election and sustain those receiving the largest number of votes. By it is plain to be seen that the council out of clear sympathy for Brown and Phillips refuses to sustain the law which gives the council their existence and their jurisdiction.

Notice is hereby given that application will be made to the parliament of Canada at the next session thereof for an Act to incorporate a company to be called "The Grand Trunk Pacific Lines Company," with power to construct and operate amongst other lines of railway a line running from a point on the Transcontinental Division of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway to St John or such other port on the Bay of Fundy as may be considered more accessible and better adapted for the purpose of the company; as well as such other lines of railway as the company from time to time deem expedient for operation in conjunction with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway System, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council; with all the usual powers granted to railway companies by the Railway Act, and in addition thereto the following powers, viz: To charter vessels, make and recover charges in steamship business, to hold lands, wharves, warehouses etc, and to appropriate lands therefor; to own hotels etc, and lay out parks; to issue bonds on all its property; to construct and operate tramways, telegraph, telephone and submarine lines, and general traffic bridges; to develop land and water powers; acquire patent rights; grant aid to settlers; and to sell or lease to or acquire other railways.

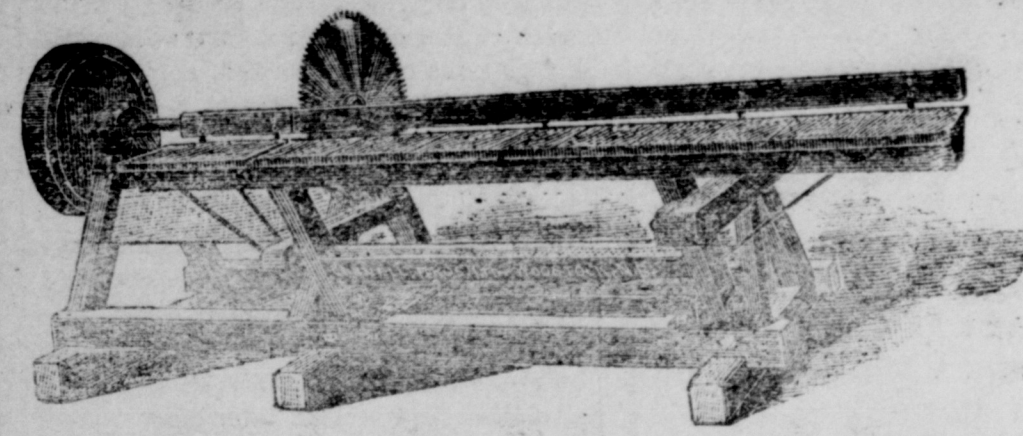
