The school trustees are looking for three new teachers. One is needed to take the department at the "College" taught last term by Miss Ethel Smith B A. Canada's aggregate trade has increased over sixteen per cent in one year. The exports amounted to \$235,483,956, which is \$11,529,010, or over 18 per cent more than last year's, and the imports show an increase of \$28,439,973 or about 10 per cent.
