### Notice of Town Fire Limit.

To all persons whom it may concern:—You are hereby notified that the following is a copy of the by-law establishing a fire limit within the Town of Woodstock and all persons will govern themselves according to its provisions.

#### A LAW.

To Regulate the Construction of Buildings and the Materials to be used in the Construction Thereof Within Certain Districts of the Town of Woodstock.

Be it enacted by the Town Council as follows:—

1 All buildings shall be constructed of brick or stone with gravel or metal roofs which may be erected within the following described district in said Town of Woodstock, which said district shall be known as the Fire District. To include that portion of the Town north of the Meduxnaque river, bounded on the east by the Saint John river, on the west by Green street, on the north by Chapel street and Regent street, on the south by the Meduxnaque river; also to include that portion of the Town south of the Meduxnaque river, bounded on the north by the Saint John river, on the west by Park and Bull streets, on the west by Green street extending to the Meduxnaque, on the east by the River Saint John. The erection of frame buildings exceeding twenty five feet in height from the street level and the use of shingle roofs to be prohibited in the Fire District.

2 All buildings now situate within the limits of the above described district which may be destroyed partially by fire and the Insurance Companies pay a total loss shall be rebuilt of either brick or stone with gravel or metal roofs.

3 All buildings situate within the said district that may be partially destroyed or damaged by fire when a total loss is not paid by the Insurance Companies shall, when repaired, be covered with gravel or metal roofs, and no wooden buildings when so repaired shall exceed twenty-five feet in height above the street level. ### TUCKER ELECTROCUTED.

Boston, June 12.—Charles L. Tucker was electrocuted at 12.12 this morning for the murder of Mabel Page.

Tucker was pronounced dead at 12.14, and was officially pronounced dead by the prison doctors at 12.19. Three applications of the current were made. The witnesses present say that the execution was successfully carried out.

When Tucker arrived in front of the death chair he drew from his trousers pocket a brief statement which he read. The statement was:

"I hope that God will forgive me for all the wrongs I have ever done in my past life. I forgive everybody who has ever wronged me. I am at peace with my Maker. May God have mercy on my soul."

Tucker then sat down in the chair, and after the guards had adjusted the straps the warden raised his hand as a signal to the electrician. After the first application of the electricity Dr. Joseph McLaughlin, the prison surgeon, made an examination and announced that the pulse was still beating. After the current had been applied a second time the surgeon detected a movement of the heart, but when the current was applied a third time. Tucker was pronounced dead. This announcement was made at 12.19.

The surgeon stated that Tucker was unconscious from the moment the first shock was sustained, and that the movements detected afterwards were due to the action of the muscles.

### THE GREATEST SHIP.

On Thursday last the new Cunard Line turbine steamship Lusitania—the world's largest liner—was successfully launched at Clydebank, near Glasgow, by her builders, John Brown & Co, the christening being performed by Dowager Lady Inverclyde, widow of the late president of the Cunard Company. The launching was witnessed by many thousands from all parts of the Country. As usual, the builders gave a luncheon to specially-invited guests; but on this occasion it more resembled a great banquet. There were over five hundred guests, and the Menu card alone was a beautiful work of art, which each guest would carefully preserve as a memento of the occasion. Sir Chas McLaren presided, and in proposing a toast said that "the Lusitania places Great Britain far ahead of the rest of the world in marine architecture."

The Lusitania is the first to be launched of the new giant Cunarders but she will be followed in about a month by her sister ship the Mauritania. She is 790 feet long, and her greatest breadth is 88 feet, while her depth moulded is 60 feet. Her displacement is about 40,000 tons and her powerful turbine engines are guaranteed to drive her through the water at a sustained speed of from 24 to 25 knots. It is estimated that when fully finished over 35,000 tons of material will have been wrought into the hull. The cabin accommodations provide for 550 first-class, 500 second-class, and 1300 third-class passengers, in addition to her crew of 800.

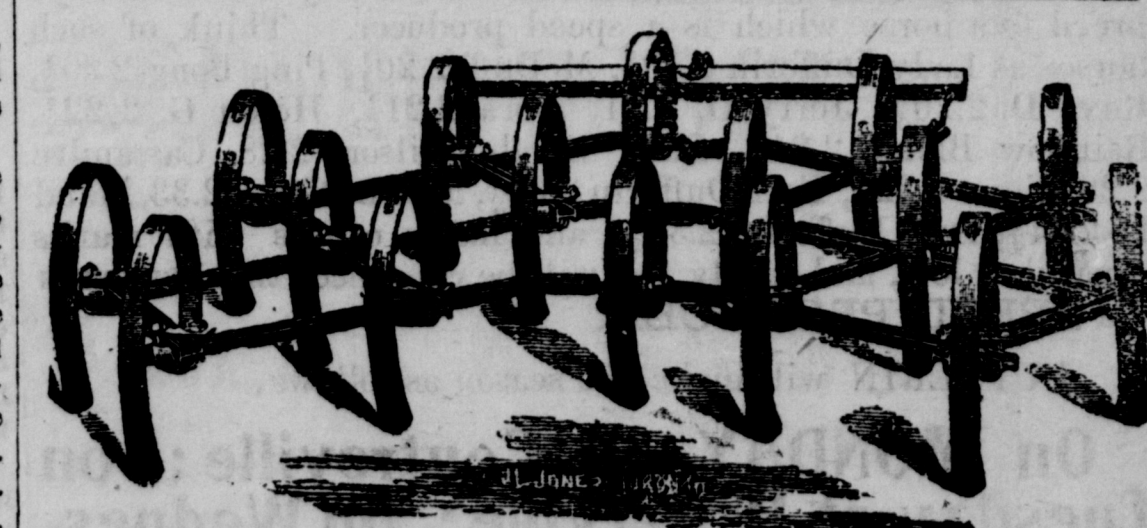
