THE EXHIBITION.

Tuesday afternoon the local Exhibition was opened with appropriate ceremony. Owing to important public business neither the Governor nor the Premier could attend, but Hon L P Farris and the other gentlemen who participated in the proceedings did their parts nobly. The first feature was a grand parade from the Carlisle Hotel to the Fair Grounds. Capt J J Bull in command of the Boys Brigade arrayed his followers in front of the Hotel. Some manoeuvres were gone through after which Hon Mr Farris inspected the Company. Then the procession formed. Preceded by the 67th Regt Band, the young soldiers marched off, followed by a barouche containing President C L S Raymond, Commissioner Farris, Judge Carleton and the Solicitor General. Other carriages contained B F Smith M P P, Warden Bailey, American Consul Denison, J K Flemming M P P, Mayor Munro, Aldermen Leighton, Henderson, Fisher and Fields. Then came a miscellaneous collection of turnouts, followed by scores on foot. At the Grounds the distinguished visitors accompanied by several veteran members, mounted the platform. Pres Raymond acted as chairman, and first introduced the Solicitor General. Hon Mr Jones made a short and practical address, congratulating the Band, the Brigade and the Exhibition officials. He said he had been to several fairs this fall, but nowhere could he find anything to beat Carleton County. The other day over in Chatham, wishing to pay them a great compliment, he told them their products looked as well as those to be seen in Carleton. The people over there were delighted for they always heard of Carleton County as being head and shoulders above all others. He was glad to see such a fine exhibit, and hoped the people would turn out and generously patronize the fair. B F Smith M P P and J Kidd Flemming M P P followed, making splendid addresses. Mayor Munro extended a welcome and Warden Bailey spoke briefly along the same strain. Hon Mr Denison spoke briefly. Judge Carleton told a story in opening. He said he was not going to give the people a long speech. By way of illustration he said he was reminded of the remark made by an urchin at a dinner given in a foreign city by some kind hearted person to the newsboys. Just at the moment when all were seated round the tables an elderly and somewhat verbose clergyman was invited to say grace. He unfortunately made the invocation lengthy. Before he was quite to the Amen, one little fellow in disgust piped in "Say Mister, cut out the lip, and sling up the grub." No doubt, said the judge, the people were in no mood for long speeches. At any rate he knew little of farming, but was glad to see so many present and hoped they would carry home pleasant memories of their visit. Hon Mr Farris briefly sketched the steps taken by him in the effort to boom the potato business. At one time it seemed as if we had no market, but now the West is taking all we ship, and it may be that the small tubers could be used profitably in the production of starch. He had great pleasure in declaring the show officially open.



The Conference of Premiers.

There is to be a conference between the federal government and the provincial premiers at Ottawa next month and several matters which have been at issue for some time will come up for consideration and possibly settlement.

The three most important subjects for discussion will probably be representation in the federal house, the fisheries and subsidies.

There has been a good deal of dissatisfaction expressed regarding the gradual diminution of the Maritime Province representation and, notably in the case of Prince Edward Island, strong arguments have been advanced to show that the island province is entitled to retain the six seats which were granted under the terms of union in 1873. At confederation Quebec was given 65 members and other provinces were to have as many as their population warranted in proportion to that of Quebec.

But Quebec has been adding to her population by annexing large stretches of settled territory, which means of increase is manifestly not open to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. If the status quo is maintained it is clear the three eastern provinces are likely to lose much of their weight in federal affairs. Perhaps some satisfactory solution of this problem can be devised.

The set demand for increased provincial subsidies was made as long ago as 1892, but up to this time it has never been heeded by the federal authorities. Each province now receives, (1) an allowance for support of government and legislature; (2) a subsidy; (3) a debt allowance, and some of the provinces get special grants. The subsidies are calculated at the rate of 80 cents a head, but a limit is set on the population for which this is allowed. The seven older provinces now get the following sum:

Saskatchewan and Alberta receive between them \$2,248,250. This makes a total of about six and three-quarter millions.

At a provincial conference held in 1902, according to the Toronto News the demands made were: 1 Larger increases in the allowances "for government and legislation"—from a total of \$375,000 to about \$1,250,000. 2. The subsidy to be 80 cents per head of the actual population until such population exceeds 2,500,000, and 80 cents per head on the excess. 3. The Dominion to pay to each province a sum to defray the cost of administering criminal justice not to exceed 20 cents per head of the actual population. Put more briefly the provinces ask for allowances three times as great as at present, for subsidies of a dollar a head of actual population, and of course, for all the debt allowances and special payments now granted.

This means that subsidies would be increased as follows:


