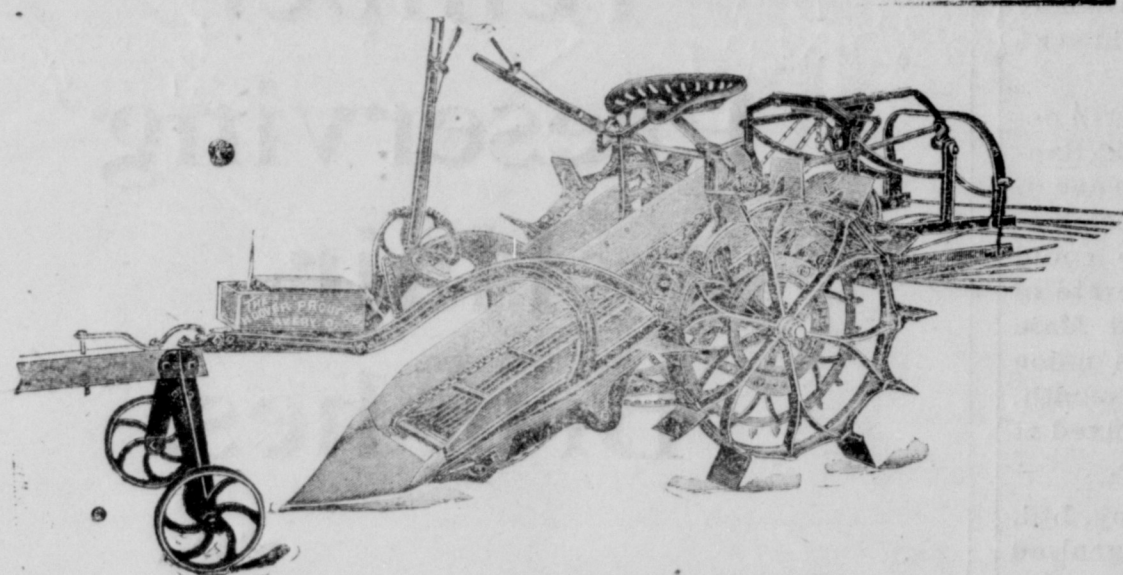

Woodstock Pupils Carry off the Honors at the St John Fair.

Collective exhibits from schools—1st, diploma and silver medal, Woodstock; 2nd, diploma and bronze medal, St. Stephen-Milltown; 3rd, diploma, Campbellton; special award, St. Andrews.

The schools at St. Stephen and Milltown are under the charge of one instructor, who spends his time partly in each town. These two exhibits were very equal and tied for second place.

The cases of work from St. Andrews was excellent, but contained models from grade VI only. A special diploma was however, awarded, for it. Best work from grade VI pupils—1st, silver medal, Clarence Riordan, Woodstock; 2nd, bronze medal, Ernest Webber, Woodstock; highly commended, Roy Trainor, St. Stephen.

Best work from Grade VII pupils—1st, silver medal, Jack Hipwell, Woodstock; 2nd bronze medal, O Parks, Milltown; highly commended James Ketchum and S Mooers, Woodstock.

Best work from grade VII pupils—1st, silver medal, F Osborne, Milltown; 2nd bronze medal, F Riordan, Woodstock; highly commended R Shives, Campbellton.

Best work from grade IX pupils—

1st, silver medal, Allan Otty, Kingston; 2nd, bronze medal, Mary Fraser, Campbellton, highly commended, Byron Burden, Fredericton.

Best set of working drawings by pupil—Grade VI, bronze medal, E Webber, Woodstock; Grade VII, bronze medal, not awarded; Grade VIII, bronze medal, G H Crawford, Kingston; Grade IX and upwards, bronze medal, not awarded.

The Judge says that the competition in the Woodwork was very close, much of the work sent in being of high class. The competition in the class of working drawings was not so keen, owing to the fact that after the drawings have been used in the school work shop they are somewhat soiled and the instructors do not care about sending many in.

Outside of the foregoing classes of advanced manual training work some very good sets of primary work were received from the following schools: Kingston Consolidated School, Protestant Orphan Asylum, St John; Woodstock Public Schools; Fairville Superior Schools.

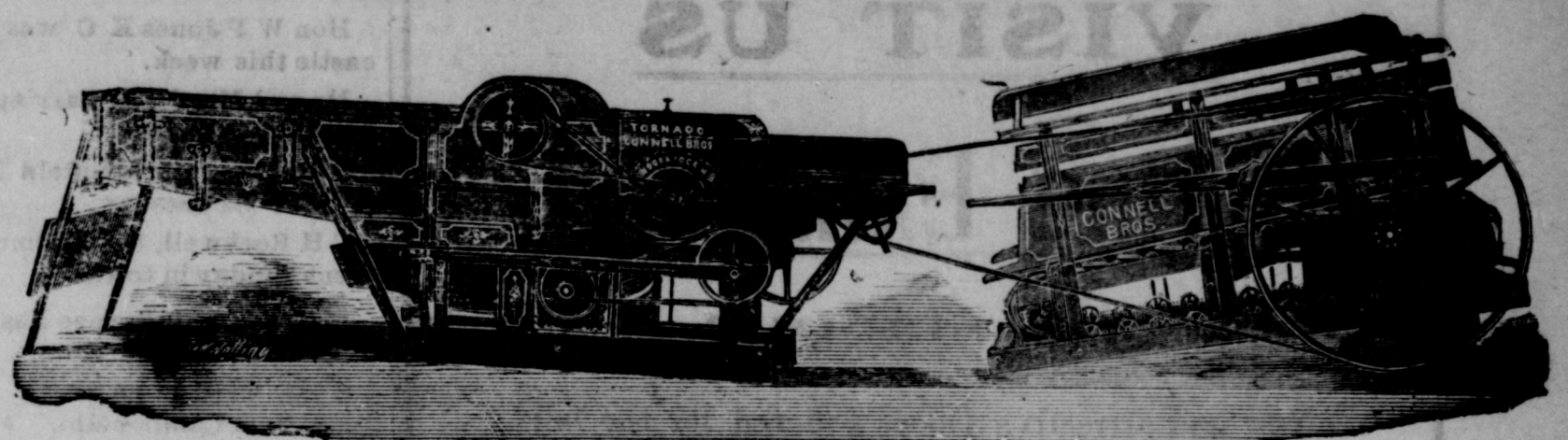
