DEATH OF A B CARVELL.

One of the oldest and best known men in the county passed away on Tuesday morning in the person of A Bishop Carvell of Lakeville. He had for some time been failing and the end was not unexpected. He was in his 78th year. Deceased was born in the county and for the early part his life resided at Bloomfield, moving about thirty five years ago to Lakeville. He is survived by his wife whose maiden name was Lindsay, four sons and three daughters. The sons are Frank Broadstreet, barrister and federal member for Carleton, Harry and Robert of Lakeville and Lewis of Boston. The daughters include Miss Bertha, matron of a hospital in Boston; Bessie, teacher at Perth, and Emma at home. The funeral services, largely attended, were held on Thursday, conducted by Rev George Ayers, pastor of the Methodist church, of which denomination the deceased was a consistent and honored member. The burial was made in the Williamstown cemetery. Mr Carvell was a man bearing an honored name in the county. He had no enemies—all were his friends—and the death of such a man is a distinct loss to any community.
