



## A New Court House.

Do you realize what a new court house means to Carleton County?

It means a debt of less than \$1.40 per head.

It means, for this is the growing age of Canada, that the debt will become less and less with the lapse of time.

It means that our grand children and their children will pay it ungrudgingly and with reverent veneration for our foresight.

It means, at the very outside, but 25 cents a year added to our taxes.

It means that by prudence, and by conservative estimate, only a paltry 10 cents a year more than we now pay.

It means in all probability, certainly in some years, that there will be nothing whatever to pay.

It means, above all, the good name, the progressive spirit, the equality with others and the credit of our people.

Read carefully, ponder long and digest well

### THE PROPOSITION.

Irrespective of the question of cost, and purely as a matter of local pride, we claim that a court house should be built at once. Yet the question of expenditure cannot be overlooked. We would not be discharging our duty to the public if we attempted to belittle the debt that it entails, or failed to point out the ways and means by which we conceive that it can be met.

We have the land. The site, therefore, involves no outlay; and the situation is, for the purpose, of the choicest kind. A first class building can be erected for \$20,000, but it would be non-producing. One can be built for \$30,000, the rooms on the first floor of which, together with those on the second floor of the registry office building, can be made to net a yearly revenue of at least \$300. This is a conservative estimate. It means ten suites of office rooms (two rooms to a suite) at \$100 per annum. We say "net" because \$30 more, per suite, can be charged for the heating, or \$300 a year. This amount will be ample to pay for the heating of the court room in addition to the offices. By this means the heating of the whole building costs the county nothing.

The cost of the building, \$30,000 can be borrowed at 4 per cent making a yearly interest charge of \$1200. This will leave a deficit of only \$200 and a janitor's salary. From that deduct the cost of heating the present building for court and council purposes, the cost of keeping the building clean—now done in a most slipshod manner, the cost of horse hire for sheriff and judge, the cost of conveying prisoners—including team and extra officers required—from the gaol to the court house and back again, the extra allowance on account of the present situation now made to all witnesses in crown cases and which the county has to pay, and you will have reduced the annual burden to be borne by the taxpayer to a minimum; in some years, perhaps, wiped it out altogether.

These figures are not fancy; they appeal alike to the intelligence of the council and the electors.

## Suppose there Should be One Soon.

The opposition papers claim to have good reasons for predicting a local election in our province during the Autumn. Indeed Mr Hazen and his estimable organizer are said to be going ahead with their plans for battle, convinced that the struggle will be over, including the shouting, long ere the swallows southward fly or the ripened sheaves be garnered.

We are not in the prediction business, and have no inside information consequently we can add nothing to the startling rumors, but to take the common sense view of the matter we would say that while there is no good reason for expecting the battle of ballots at an early date there are possible circumstances which might induce our rulers to feel the public pulse at a not too distant hour. That being the case it behooves all friends of the administration whether the call be issued early or late, to be prepared for it, as it must in the very nature of things be heard within the next year and a half.

Let us take it for granted, just for the sake of argument, that we shall have an election this fall. Does any sane person suppose that Mr Hazen's little band of ten will be more than doubled? Can he hold all that he already has, and in addition muster up gains sufficient to give him more than half the house? To win he must retain his present following and capture fourteen seats from the enemy. Where can he get them? That's the question. Suppose we cast an eye over the province. Does he think he can win Restigouche? Has he the faintest hope of carrying Gloucester? Will he hold what he already has in Northumberland? Is Kent ready to desert the Tweedie-Pugsley-Jones administration? Surely no one knows better than the respected leader of the opposition that the whole of the North Eastern portion of our province will scarcely yield him one lone supporter. The great metropolitan constituency of Westmorland has given striking evidence of its political position. It holds out not a ray of hope, and little more can be said for Albert, where Messrs Osman and Ryan are so strongly entrenched. The county of St John is safe enough for the government, and even in the City where things have not been going lately to the satisfaction of the Liberal party, there are hundreds and hundreds who will tell you that Mr Hazen will not dare try his personal fate. In Charlotte we all know what

a plucky up-hill fight four almost unknown Colts put up against a Big Four not long ago. We further know that the party in Charlotte are sanguine of redeeming at least half the representation. Kings has never yet gone back on the astute Attorney-General, and there is no evidence that any change has come over the electorate. Queens is sure to return Hon Mr Farris and his colleague,—indeed it will be hard to find a couple of willing victims to face the government ticket. Sunbury is at best debatable territory. Should Mr Hazen desert the tight little river county there would be no doubt whatever of the result. If he shall decide to stay it will take a bigger pot than they have yet put in to hold the seat for the opposition,—and that to use the classic words of a not unjustly famous authority, "will be going some." York is one County that has been marked with red by the intelligence department of the opposition. We do not think Mr Crockett's chance victory in 1904 should cause any great feelings of uneasiness in the government ranks. If the party there heal all local differences and present a united front there can be no question as to the result. We now come to Carleton, where the fighting is sure to be heavy and the winners will know they have been in a scrap, but for all that we do not think sufficient votes will be marked in the manner to elect the opposition ticket. Victoria and Madawaska are hopeless for the opposition. Where will Mr Hazen be able to muster a dozen supporters? Echo answers "Where."

## Abandons the Ancient Colony.

Advises from Newfoundland contain intimation to the effect that A B Morine, leader of the Opposition in that colony has resigned his seat and will return to Canada. He has already dipped into politics in Nova Scotia, where on one occasion he tried for a seat in the local house. He was also an unsuccessful candidate for a seat at Ottawa in at least one election being defeated by the present Judge Frank Forbes. No doubt Mr Morine will again have a try at the game in our sister province, as the local election will soon be on and there is apparently no person to lead the Opposition, in case there should be such a body in the next Assembly. At the present out of 38 members only Mr Tanner of Pictou and Mr McLeod of Cumberland represent the conservative party and both these estimable gentlemen are thought to be doomed to certain defeat.

## TOWN COUNCIL.

There was a special meeting of the Board last Monday evening at which Coun Henderson presided. Couns Dunbar and Fisher were absent. As these members are chairmen of the two committees most concerned with the business that was to come up nothing of importance took place. It seemed to be the feeling of those present that another opportunity should be given the absent ones before going on with any business outside of routine.

## OBITUARY.

At midnight on Friday last Gideon Shaw of Somerville, died after being confined to his bed several months. He was in his 83rd year and leaves a widow, one son, and three daughters who are Nehemiah Shaw of Charleston; Mrs Odbur Tracy of Rosedale; Mrs A Palmer and Mrs Richard Gray of Upper Knoxford. The funeral, conducted by Rev S A Baker, was held at Centreville and the remains were laid to rest in the Baptist burying ground at that place. Mr Shaw was for years a resident of Charleston but a few years ago moved back to Somerville where he had spent his youthful days. He was a man of high principles, thoroughly respected by a large circle of friends. Amasa Shaw of Upper Brighton is a brother of the deceased.—Dispatch.
